A Note from Pastor Toni

Dear Friends,

I just read that humans process 500,000 bits of information per day. That works out to 110 bits of information per second. I'm not really sure what a "bit" is, but I think this explains the reason it feels as though my head is spinning much of the time, trying to process all that (I think) needs to be processed.

Don't you wonder sometimes how we survived without our cell phones stuck in our pocket constantly, so that everyone can get hold of us whenever they (think) they need to get ahold of us? Last week, while on vacation, Scott and I headed off somewhere—I don't know, lunch? The grocery store? I realized a few blocks away that I had forgotten my phone. We drove a little further, And I. Just. Couldn't. Do. It. We had to turn around, go back and get my phone. Because, you know...someone might need me.

Two Saturday nights ago, I think I was driving everyone a little



batty, making sure they had gotten all my messages about what needed to happen on Sunday morning. Because. You. Know. You. Can't. Get. Along. Without. Me.

Of course, I know better than that. I really do. I did better my second Saturday off. I fussed a bit in my head and then I just let it go. You. Can. Get. Along. Without. Me.

The important thing that I'm reminded in all this—in my inability to Just. Chill. Out. On. Vacation. —is knowing that we have to carve out SPACE—let go of some of the ACTIVITY—And. Just. BREATHE.—in order to make a place for God to work. When you're always DOING, always BUZZING, always CON-SIDERING, God has to work harder to shimmy into our lives sideways. And, I really don't want God to have to do that. I know that God WILL, because I'm important enough that God

isn't going to give up on me (or you either, because you are important, too!), but my whole understanding of who I am RE-QUIRES God settling into me COMPLETE-LY, and not just fitting in sideways.

Does that make sense?

Over 6 weeks beginning September 12, we're going to be talking about Spiritual Disciplines during worship. These are things that I believe are REALLY important. They were important before I thought I needed to have my cell phone attached to me 24/7. They were important before I was sure that first, my kids, and then my church, couldn't get along without me. (They all seem to survive just fine when I'm An undivided heart. Making space for God not there). They'll still be important when I have no choice but to slow down because these same kids have decided I shouldn't be driving anymore. (I know, that happens

to all of us at some point). It is my connection to God that's important, more than anything else. I can live without my phone (I think). I can live without the internet (for a short time when absolutely necessary). I can even live without my calendar nearby (though I haven't tried to do that in over 30 years!). But I can't live without God. And these disciplines will help me to accomplish this deepest desire of my heart. And yours, too.

Psalm 86:11-12 says, "Teach me your way, O Lord, that I may walk in your truth; give me an undivided heart to revere your name. I give thanks to you, O Lord my God, with my whole heart, and I will glory your name forever."

Since 1996, I have been a part of DMORT (Disaster Mortuary Operational Response Team) with FEMA to assist medical examiners with body identification of human remains in disaster situations.

On September 11, 2001, I watched TV just as everyone else did that day and watched in awe the events of the day. I was notified that tims and their families. Please keep evening that I was to leave from O'Hare in Chicago on a C-130 cargo plane and go to the World Trade Center.

The first week I was there I was assigned to Family Assistance and we did phone interviews with families of airline victims. The second week and a half I was assigned to WTC morgue operations in which we were involved with the recovery of remains from the "pit" and the transportation to the Office of the

Text: Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23
