Dear Friends,

With the coming of June, we enter the season of Summer. At least in my thinking.

This is the time for graduations and celebrations. This is the time for planting flowers and enjoying the blooms of perennials that have laid quietly in wait for warm weather and refreshing rain. This is the time for windows open, hats on and sunscreen applied. This is time for vacation!

Scott and I are taking some time away this summer, but I'm not sure we're ready to travel. I've seen photos of warm places where palm trees grow and have been thinking about ocean sounds and fresh sea food.

Our oldest wants me to go hiking with him out west and it's a temptation. There are lots of options, but I won't be surprised if the final decision in-

volves back-porch sitting, a few good books and a couple of day trips. But who knows?

Self-care is what's important. For all of us. It's not so much about planning an annual getaway, a road trip to some great destination or whatever kind of adventure you might be dreaming about:

refresh their roots. That made sense in the 12<sup>th</sup> century, and it continues to make sense today! We need steady renewal and nurture to continue to be fruitful on God's behalf in whatever work we're doing.

I've learned from Kathy Smitha that whenever my computer begins acting up I need to shut it down, wait a few minutes and turn it back on again. It always works! I have a feeling that the same kind of process works for me, too. When I start "acting up" it's time to shut down. Some rest beside flowing waters to refresh my roots sounds like a pretty good option before returning to whatever it is that needs to be done.

I hope you'll consider the same thing for yourself. The world can live without us for awhile so that we can restore and refresh. Taking time for self-care allows the space needed to listen for God's word. It allows the space needed to allow the hard drive to rest, and for the synapses to fire more productively. (I


have no idea if that's physiologically correct, but I haven't shut down for awhile, so that's all I've got right now.) I do know that in Matthew 14:13 we're told that Jesus withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself. And that wasn't an unusual thing for him to do. If Jesus knew he needed to regularly take breaks, it makes sense to follow his example in this matter, in the same way we try to follow in all the other ways he's taught us.

So...enjoy your summer. Take some breaks. Breathe. Come to worship. (A couple of you come back for the first time each week! It's so good to see you again!). Celebrate the good. Pray through the struggles. Spend time in Christian fellowship. Bless one another.

Through it all, may your spirit be refreshed.

The Attorney Advisor on our team of professionals assisting us with the sanctuary issue contacted us to let us know some "very positive news" as he described it. The attorney for our insurance company has contacted our attorney saying they would like to enter into pre-litigation mediation. Our attorney is in favor of this and the attorneys will get together and discuss. It's not formal mediation because we are not in litigation. The Attorney Advisor feels this development is an acknowledgement

from our insurance company that there is strong evidence to support our position, but much remains to be seen. We don't know how soon this will be taking place and there is still a ways to go, but it is a step in the right direction for our situation and our team continues to work very diligently on our behalf.

## MISSION MINDED

Thanks to everyone who supported our fish fundraiser!

*Each month we are highlighting a different organization that our church supports through offerings.*

**Operation Classroom** is another organization that we support through the Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church. (Giving Code OC5.) Because of your offerings we are able to donate \$250 annually.

**Operation Classroom** was started in 1987 by Indiana United Methodists to partner with the United Methodist Church in Liberia and Sierra Leone with the mission of: 1. Upgrading UMC secondary education in Liberia and Sierra Leone; 2. Being an avenue of renewal for the United Methodist Church; 3. Providing hands-on mission experiences for United Methodists.

**“Education:** It’s not enough to just provide an education. The RIGHT education is what’s important. Education that has the potential to “shift paradigms” in ways that may not be culturally normative, but ARE culturally appropriate. Education empowers the youth of Liberia and Sierra Leone to think differently and changes the course of their future.

**The Poverty Puzzle:** We’ve learned you can’t solve the issues of poverty by simply “providing.” The key to ending poverty is equipping young men and women with an education that helps them see themselves differently, and equips them with the tools and perspective they need to provide for themselves, their families, and provide leadership in their communities.

**Community:** There are many things to be admired in rural African communities: Interdependence, cooperative experience, care for family and neighbor. Finding ways to deal with the issues of poverty WITHOUT losing the good things of that community are essential to the mission of Operation Classroom, and to the purpose behind the development of the African Enterprise Academy program.”

### WORK TRIP TO MIDWEST MISSION DISTRIBUTION CENTER:

The last week of May we had a work team at the Distribution Center, including Carol Beiter, and Bill & Donna Hemmig; joined by Sharon Westfall and her sister, Debbie Bell. They took with them a couple sewing machines which the Center refurbishes and donates to women who need a way to support their families. They also took baby sweaters (made by Jeanne Middleton and Pam Michel), and children’s pajama sets (made by Carol Beiter and friends). If you like to sew, knit, or crochet – talk to Pam or Carol about getting the necessary patterns for these or other items the Center needs.

### June 6

*2nd Sunday after Pentecost*

Communion

Text: Mark 3:20-35

#### **Title: Family Ties**

Theme: It had to be hard for the family of Jesus to understand what he was doing when he left home to begin ministry. This text gives evidence to their concern for him. When Jesus responds, he widens the definition of family in a way that perhaps alarms his “blood” family while connecting others who before may have been doing life on their own.

### June 13

*3rd Sunday after Pentecost*

Text: Mark 4:26-34

#### **Title: Seeds and the Kingdom of God**

Theme: Jesus tells two parables, describing what the kingdom of God is like. We’re reminded that even though we may not understand how seeds grow, still we plant, and they grow. Even the smallest of seeds can produce the greatest of harvests. What might Jesus be wanting to teach us?

### June 20

*4th Sunday after Pentecost*

Text: Mark 4:35-41

#### **Title: Storms**

Theme: A storm turns a peaceful sail to the other side of the Lake into a time of crisis for the disciples who are convinced they’re going to die. They awaken Jesus and he calms the gale-force winds and waves. How do we respond to chaotic times? What do the actions of Jesus teach us in how to respond when challenges arise?

### June 27

*5th Sunday after Pentecost*

Rev. Mike Dixon preaching

Text: 2 Corinthians 8:7-15

#### **Title: Formula for a Truly Rich Life**

Theme: It's not easy to live by God's value system in a society that values image and appearance and status symbols. It should work the other way. 
## United Methodist Men

Less than .1% of married couples make it to their 70th wedding anniversary but June and Ed were destined to be a part of the few to make it. When asked their advice to young couples who are getting married, they said, “Effort has to be 100% on both sides, never go to bed angry, and respect each other’s right to be stupid”. Yes, you read that right. These two have a sense of humor about each other and the world.

“We don’t do a lot together, but we have our own hobbies” Ed told me. You’d be wrong if you thought these two folks, now in their early nineties would be relaxing in their retirement. We greatly appreciate your continued support of agencies in our community who help those in need. It's how we show we are Christians as that's what God expects of us!




