

ENDOWMENT FUND UPDATE by John Finlay, Endowment Chair

At the end of the last quarter of this year (9-30-18) our church endowment fund balance with the Marshall County Community Foundation was \$226,153.65.

The Foundation is very secure with a total value of over \$36

million.

Recently, our church received \$8,607 additional money from the endowment fund. This brought the total in spendable funds to \$36,836.91 in our account.

To date, First United Methodist Church has received \$111,139.44 from the MCCF. This is money that has gone for many projects that otherwise would have been requested from the general church budget.

Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) by Melissa Christiansen

First UMC's Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) – Connecting the Pastor, Staff, and Congregation.

Committee's Function and Purpose – Including Assistance with "Conflict Resolution"

This article is to address the purpose of the Staff Parish Relations Committee so you can help us effectively manage our most important task of leading and guiding our Church's Staff. The ministry entrusted to this committee is in its name – Relations. In every size congregation, the SPRC must focus on building strong relationships between the staff and the congregation, and between the congregation and the District Superintendent (DS). Finding a balance between building relationships and handling administrative tasks can be difficult, so the ministry of this committee is crucial for this aspect of a vital and effective congregation.

The Administrative function includes both leadership and management. Leadership is the role of "keeping an eye on the big picture". Even in the midst of meetings, celebrations, or crises, the SPRC members must remember they are part of the body of Christ with a mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ

for the transformation of the world. As members of this important committee, we operate by putting aside personal positions and desires in order to help our church move closer to God's vision. We very much recognize that Confidentiality is one of our most important guidelines to follow in our role as a SPRC member.

The Management function is the role of tending to daily activities so that details are taken care of and strategies are implemented. Management includes holding both staff and congregation accountable for carrying through with plans, promises, and dealing with both the celebrations and disappointments inherent in any human family and church.

Summary of Specific Tasks:

- Encourage, strengthen, nurture, support, and respect the pastor and staff and their families, including advocating for a healthy work/life balance.
- Promote unity in the church.
- Confer with the staff on the effectiveness of ministry and impediments to effectiveness.
- Conduct annual staff evaluations.

- Write job descriptions for staff and update them as necessary.
- Confer with staff about continuing education and spiritual formation.
- Confer with the District Superintendent about the clergy leadership for the congregation.
- Recommend staff positions to the church council.
- Create written personnel policies and misconduct policies for the congregation.
- Consult on matters of staff support including housing, vacation, insurance, pension, and other matters.

Our Church's SPRC membership is made up of:

- Nine members, each appointed for terms of three years each, in three classes. This rotation policy ensures continuity on the committee.
- Lay Member to Annual Conference; Lay Leader of Plymouth First UMC; Pastor

The SPRC meets 4 to 12 times each year, usually the third Monday of the month.

SPRC's Assistance with "Conflict Resolution"

Our committee receives questions as to the proper procedure that a staff member or member of our congregation is to follow if a concern or complaint arises. The following is the procedure we ask you to follow:

- Church Member and/or Staff Member should first have made an attempt to resolve the conflict themselves with the other party first (Common Sense Response for both parties of a conflict).
- If there is still a conflict to resolve, a member of the SPRC should be contacted by the person(s) to discuss the issues of this conflict. Note: FUMC's SPRC is to be contacted first, not our District Superintendent or our Bishop.

- This SPRC member confirms that there has already been discussion taken place with the two parties involved in the concern or complaint. If there has not been, it will be suggested that one occurs and the SPRC member will offer to be present for this meeting.
- Whether the issue is or is not resolved at this point, the SPRC member reports to the entire SPRC committee the concern or complaint.
- Discussion by the SPRC Committee on the unresolved issue(s) will then take place. The SPRC can involve The District Superintendent as backup for help in this resolution process.
- Confidentiality is required by all individuals involved in the conflict/resolution process.

through the mess in the box and on the floor and there was paper everywhere. But still no baby Jesus.

He wrote to the woodcrafter. The website said baby Jesus was included, but he wasn't there. Where was baby Jesus?

The woodcrafter replied that he had discontinued baby Jesus because customers usually lost the little baby woodcarving anyway.

The pastor asked if he wouldn't mind carving one for them and sending it. The woodcarver said, sure—but he couldn't get it to them in time for Christmas. Probably February. The pastor said that was fine. They'll have baby Jesus for their nativity next year.



It seems to me that including baby Jesus in a manger scene is pretty important. Whether or not he gets lost in the shuffle, he's what the story is about. But even more important than having him in our manger scenes, is keeping him in the middle of all the moments of our lives.

And so, even as we will sooner or later take down our decorations, let's keep the gift of Christ's presence at the front and center of all we do: guiding us, shaping our interactions and responses. Because it's his presence among us that makes all the difference.





What a year we have had in Adams Street Ministries. We have restarted the high school program, with four of the young men being confirmed in their local churches. Our Jr High program is as strong as ever with one of our ladies being confirmed in her church, making a total of five young adults in the entire Adams Street Ministries program being confirmed. This is a huge accomplishment and step in the direction of leadership in the church.
