

Kitchen Remodeling

The driving force for the Kitchen Remodeling is Health and Safety!

On October 31, while trying to heat soup in 2 roasters and make coffee, a fuse blew and Jeff Mills had to be called after hours to come remedy the problem.

On November 17, the United Methodist Men met for a breakfast meeting, followed by Mother's Club making "Meals for Methodists". Before all the dishes were washed up, the drain piping for the 2-bay sink had completely disconnected from the sink. (See photo.) Prior to this, it has been necessary to leave a wash-tub under the left side where leaking routinely occurs.

The 3 major problems that were originally identified:

1. At the seams, the flooring is cracking, curling, and chipping away. The seams are located in traffic paths and in front of the ranges. This has become a tripping hazard as well as being unsanitary. Bacteria and mop water get in the cracks and under the flooring and there is no way to keep this from happening. Jeff Mills has repeatedly made temporary repairs but the cracking, curling, and chipping continues to worsen.
2. The 2 electric water heaters that serve the entire building produce very little hot water. In order to have enough hot water for washing dishes or other cleaning tasks, it is necessary to heat water on the stoves.

Lime from hard water has built up in the heaters and in the piping. Traditional electric water heaters do not replace hot water as rapidly as gas water heaters. And they keep water hot 24 hours a day, whether or not water is being used, increasing the electric bill
3. The electric system is unreliable and out-dated. The style of fuses/breakers in the existing box are not even manufactured anymore and are not available for purchase. The receptacle strips were never designed to carry the voltage necessary when using several heating appliances at the same time, such as roasters, crock-pots, or coffee makers.

"Praying is so, so important, and we absolutely should pray. But, after we pray, we should also take action. I believe that God wants to use us to be blessings for other people, in His name. We just have to be willing to step out in faith." (Excerpt from Doing More than Saying "I'll Pray for You")

The above statement really spoke to me as I prepared to join the group going to Henderson Settlement. Initially, I had my doubts...would a "middle-aged" woman with no construction experience be more of a hindrance than a help? Sure, I could swing a hammer and I'd worked alongside my dad in his wood shop filling nail holes with wood putty and sanding, but siding a house...that would require real work with real tools! What was I thinking?

Not willing to admit defeat, I thought I could at least "look the part." I bought a nail apron (which I decorated with some ribbon and buttons), packed my grandfather's hammer, a tape measure, and unbeknownst to my traveling companions, I also packed six types of footwear...work boots, rain boots, tennis shoes, dress shoes, flip flops and slippers. I was ready...

Once at the worksite, all my insecurities disappeared. The Work Team embraced me wholeheartedly and were eager to explain each step of the process, from tearing off the old siding to putting on the blue foamboard and the new siding. We all found our groove and worked like a team on a mission. I know when I first heard the terms "C" channel and "J" channel my eye glazed over, but by mid-week I was speaking the lingo and had learned that tin snips have different colored handles for a reason!

What else did I learn? I learned I wasn't there to build the Taj Mahal, nor was I expected to have any special skills, just a willingness to step out in faith, God would provide the rest. And He did. God provided the right people with the right skills, safe travels, beautiful weather, WONDERFUL Team Members, a homeowner (Jackie) who was blessed by our work, and a church family that continues to support us with their faithfulness and their friendship.

Thank you for giving us all the opportunity to take action.

This work team finished siding Jackie's house near Henderson Settlement when they were there in October. Last year our team completed 2 walls, and Jackie waited an entire year to have the remainder of the work done.
