Though we've experienced the heat and humidity and other signs of summer, it feels like everything else since February: we ought to have a doover!! Lacking that possibility, I figure, let's make the most of every moment we have, every opportunity to learn and grow and to be who God calls us to be.

Sometime mid-June, I received a note sent to the churches of our District giving us the assignment of putting together a Dismantling Racism Plan by August 1st. I don't remember reading it, and the deadline of August 1st probably seemed a lifetime away, so I completely forgot about it until receiving another note from the District on August 1st, telling me that since so many of us hadn't submitted our plan, the deadline was being extended to August 15th.

The "Plan" was/is to include 2 goals for each the pastor and the congregation. I decided that the goals I have set for myself are reasonable goals to challenge you to, as well. I'm hoping

you'll accept what I'm calling the September Challenge.

The September Challenge involves

Each of us taking an inventory on our personal biases. There are 2 inventories that have been recommended to me. The first is free and is called The Implicit Bias Test. It takes 5 minutes to complete. It is based on "Project Implicit" by Harvard University, and is designed to reveal the Implicit Bias hardwired into us by our conditioning. Recreated here by MTV, the test is no less accurate and always eye-opening. It can be found at: https:// implicit.harvard.edu/implicit/ takeatestv3.html

I have taken this quick inventory and will take a second one that has a cost, as a part of the Residence in Ministry (RIM) group I mentor. All of us in RIM are taking this inventory and it will be a part of a broader conversation mid-September. I'll share more about that one when I've completed it.

The intention is that this will be a personal learning experience, and not one whose results you are expected to share with others unless you want to.

Read 1-2 resources to learn more about racism, racial justice and anti-racism. I have already completed the book White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism by Robin Diangelo. It was one of several I am interested in reading and it happened to be available on Libby, which is a free app that you can download and read books (again, for free!) using your library card.

I am looking forward to reading several others that I have obtained, and I will include a resource list of possibilities in this newsletter that you might find helpful for choosing. You can also access our UMC General Commission on Religion and Race website that offers articles and other resources. I am looking at taking a course called "You Are Here: First Steps for White Christians." Again, this course is available online and is "at your own pace." There is a charge for the course.

These 2 goals can be accomplished on your own and may be helpful for you in many ways. But, as so many of us have discovered, learning and awareness is enhanced in community with others. I would like to extend my September Challenge into an October Challenge: to meet together face to face and

talk about what we've learned, what growth areas we've discovered, what doesn't feel comfortable, and whatever else has been triggered as a result of our reading and study and reflection. We can meet once and decide if we'd like to meet again. The date of that gathering will be determined later.

I want to continue learning and growing and stretching throughout my life. Some learnings come more easily than others, some come at my own initiative, while at other times I realize—because of what's happening in the world around me—that there's so much of which I am unaware. So, I need to open my heart to seeing and learning.

I hope you'll join me on this journey, as God continues offering us opportunities to grow.

Online Giving Using Vanco

Download the free app from either the App Store or Google Play.

Allow access to location services if you'd like to use the app's "Find Churches Near Me" feature or search for "GivePlus Church". The app is free and you are not charged to make donations.

After you select our church, it automatically becomes your "home" or "default" church. The next time you open the app, the church you last selected will already be displayed.

GivePlus Church donations can be made with all major debit/credit cards. Use your phone's camera to quickly scan your card information or enter it manually. You can also give or pay using your checking or savings account. If you like, you may add to your donation to the church to help offset fees. If you set up an account and are logged in, you will receive a receipt via email, and you will also be able to view transactions in your giving history. You may set up recurring giving if you like. If you are giv-



ing to multiple funds, you can even set up different frequencies of recurring donations for each fund to which you are donating.
