June Happenings

Dear Friends,

For the past several weeks, when I've opened up Facebook, it has shown me memories of the sabbatical I took beginning in May 2015, the year before I moved to Plymouth to join in ministry alongside you.

I spent about 6 weeks of my sabbatical in Europe. The first week and a half,

our daughter Dominique and granddaughter Olivia accompanied me, and we spent time in Rome visiting cathedrals and historical sites, taking in as much as we possibly could. I know the girls

grew weary of all the places I dragged them, but they were good sports and we still talk about the places we were able to visit, and the "pizza, pasta, salad" which was our main dietary intake. We took a day trip to Tuscany (so beautiful!) before boarding a plane and heading to Paris. My friend Deb met us there, and for 3 days the 4 of us visited the Eiffel Tower, The Louvre, the Arc de Triomphe, Notre Dame Cathedral and other amazing sights.

A few weeks ago, at about the time Notre Dame caught fire, a "Facebook Memory" popped up, with Olivia standing at the baptismal font just inside the doors of the cathedral, touching the water to her forehead. Sad for what was lost, but thankful for the

> memories and the rebuilding that will happen there.

After the girls left for home, Deb and I traveled by train to St. Jean in south France, where the 500 mile long

Camino de Santiago begins. This 2000 year old walk across northern Spain was a spiritual pilgrimage for me, one where I spent much of the next 32 days walking in quiet prayer, listening for God's voice and direction for the next chapter of my life. It was during that time when I opened myself to the possibility of moving. The following Spring, when our superintendent of-

### Youth & Education by Barbie Pickut


We are almost to the end of the school year, which available at https:// brings some new opportunities for our ministry to kids in our church and community:

Midwest Mission Distribution Center: On May 12, Carol Beiter, Sharon Westfall, Debbie Bell, and Donna & Bill Hemmig headed to the Midwest Mission Distribution Center in Chatham, Illinois to represent Plymouth First UMC while we worked as "weekly missionaries". We sorted, mended, washed, and packed hospital linens headed to the Congo. We built school desks out of discarded bleacher wood. We assembled layette kits for newborns and their mothers, and school kits for children to



provide them with basics such as pencils, rulers, notebooks, scissors, and crayons. And we disassembled (yes, that's right!) many flood buckets that had been donated but needed to be checked for the proper items. Each day the MMDC staff shared stories with us of how the items they ship bless the lives of people around the world, and how God is at work providing the means to accomplish more than we could ever imagine.
