# A Note from Pastor Toni

Friends,

Although I see some green sprouts beginning to emerge from my garden out back, everything still looks pretty stark outside. Just a couple of days ago, I understand 10 inches of snow fell to the west of Indianapolis. My daughter and granddaughter's plans to do outdoor activities during spring break are now on "hold." Hiking and horseback riding and even swimming inside at a water park seem less inviting when you're still wearing your winter coat and gloves.

"It doesn't feel like Easter," I've been told. And yet we know that Easter is so much more than sunshine and spring flowers and budding trees.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead had to stop people in their tracks when they first heard the news. There are some things that are hard to wrap your mind around, and this would be at the top of that list. We're familiar with the story of the resurrection, perhaps we've heard it our whole lives and have become so familiar with it that it doesn't "wow" us anymore—but can you imagine hearing that news for the first time? Being the one to discover the tomb to be empty? Then seeing and talking with the risen Savior? Seeing the wounds in his feet and hands?

We can only imagine. And yet we live our lives today as people of the resurrection. We've been given this promise, this hope, this possibility of new life. And yet we're not always convinced that can change can happen. Things are as they are. It is what it is.

Perhaps the most widely publicized change in recent days is how Astronaut Scott Kelly's DNA changed after being in space for a year. Identical twin to Mark, they now have different DNA, which—according to the ways of our world—doesn't happen. But it seems to me if someone's DNA can change, then so can other aspects of people's lives that we tend to consider as "just the way it is."

We have a God who can do amazing things. Something amazing happened in the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. Amazing things are still happening today.

Keep your eyes open. It may not look like Easter outside quite yet. But it is happening all around.





I like this title: Easter is Over – Now What? But, I've always read that you don't choose a title until you have the material written. Uh oh, I'm in trouble because I really think I'm going with this title.

Easter is always a very meaningful season but this year it really came alive to me. After all these years of celebrating Easter I saw Easter through fresh eyes. The reason is that I've been teaching a Bible Study at Miller's Assisted Living titled <u>WINDOWS ON EASTER</u> by Bill Crowder. Using this Bible Study by Crowder I was able to see a different perspective and gain a new appreciation for what I had become to think of as "familiar".

The class and I were able to look at Christ's final days on earth by looking through the "windows" provided by some of the people who were there—Malchus, Judas Iscariot, the Centurion, Joseph of Arimathea, Mary Magdalene and the other women disciples, and the disciples on the road to Emmaus.

- 2. Specific prayer is an opportunity for us to see God at work. When we see Him respond in specific ways to specific requests, our faith grows.
  - 3. Specific prayer creates a lighter load. You reduce the problem into a prayer sized challenge.

The students present their offerings to God through music, art and drama, and the group shares in the ritual of Holy Communion. At that time, the gym becomes a sanctuary and the Spirit of God is felt throughout the service.

#### A FEW WORDS FROM CORRYNE WICK

#### **Director of Children & Youth Ministries**

Lately, I've been thinking about Spiritual Fruit and the fruits of our labors. I've wondered. I've pondered. And then I got a thought for others: its spring. The time when we plant seeds. And, at the end of summer, we harvest.

The reason I'm thinking of this is because as workers in the fields, we plant seeds in the hearts and minds of others. And I may be the fruit of someone's labor for Christ a thousand years ago. The chain goes unbroken back to Jesus dying for us on the Cross.

We may not be seeing the fruits of our labors in this lifetime. But, perhaps, when we get to heaven and look back we will be able to see what our actions did.

Sometimes it seems like we aren't making an impact because we cannot see what

is going on and because life is crazy at times. An analogy for this is: if I plant a seed and then disturb it before it grows up to see what is going on, I run the risk of killing the plant. In other words, plant the seed, let God do the work...but don't get discouraged if you can't see what is happening on the inside. Because Jesus can see what is going on even if we cannot.



Be like squirrels: plant a bunch of seeds and forget where they are!


