I'm *sheepishly* thinking of my own personal tendencies as a sinner.

I wonder if even God has his down days when he says: "I just haven't caught a sheep yet today and that makes me sad!" Not to disappoint, maybe I go astray just to give him the pleasure of catching me. While God loves each of us more than we can know or understand...sometimes I think it is a lack of knowing how much he loves us that causes us to go astray in the first place.

Mission Witness "We were walking the dusty path [20 minutes] to church. Lost in memories of comfortable cars and smooth roads in the United States, we caught up with a group of ladies also walking. We greeted them with "Jaimashi" [praise the Messiah} and asked where they had walked from. They named a village far to the east of us they had left home a 7 a.m. to walk the three hours to Tansen. The church here is a true community of believers - and people walk extreme distances to come to worship. For us the dusty road was suddenly sacred ground."

I've shared with you along the way, bits and pieces about the sabbatical I took in 2015. The highlight of my time away was about 35 days of walking the Camino de Santiago across northern Spain. A friend and I joined other travelers along the wellmarked and worn trail that thousands of pilgrims have walked since the Middle Ages, ending up at the Cathedral de Santiago where Saint James the Great, one of the Apostles of Jesus, is thought to be entombed.

It was a holy trek, an incredible experience

for me; one that I want to do again someday. We were gifted with wonderful hospitality. We were welcomed with open arms wherever we went there were people ready to answer questions, offer us direction, or a cup of cold water. One of the highlights for me, was being welcomed to the communion table in a Roman Catholic church, where the priest held out his arms and said, come-specifically inviting we pilgrims, along with the members of the church. We were grateful to step forward and receive the sacrament. as brothers and sisters in Christ.

Hospitality is an essential part of who we are as Christ's Body. We are all on a journey in this life, and some of us do so without companions to encourage us along the way. Some of us journey without a home, without a sense of belonging, without enough food in our tummies, and without the knowledge of Christ's open arms that welcome us all. without regard for where we've been, what we look like, what we have or anything else that too often separates us from one another.

I think of that conversation between Jesus and Peter on the

beach. Jesus had asked Peter, "Do you love me?"

"Yes, Lord," Peter answered, "You know that I do."

"Then feed my sheep. Tend my lambs," Jesus responded.
