A.S.K. Ministries: Preparing the Next Generation of Church Leaders by Aaron Woodcox

I am beginning to close in on the first year of my ministry with A.S.K. Over this past year I have witnessed a transformation in the young adults who are part of this amazing program that has such a rich history within the community. I have learned so much from this core group of students. I have been honored and blessed by meeting and spending time with them. Whether it has been by witnessing young adults like Matthew Finney taking that leap of faith and being baptized and accepting Jesus Christ as his personal savior or by just watching the growth of many others in their relationship with the Lord. What I have witnessed in the past year is the transformation of young adults into the next generation of leaders within the church. I have witnessed young adults like Andrew Morrison serving in worship at the Plvmouth Church of the Brethren, whether it be serving as an usher and even learning the new sound and computer systems for both the traditional and contemporary Sunday services. I have also witnessed Addie Kingston volunteering in the Nursery at Trinity United Methodist, and these are just a few examples of the leadership that is beginning to take hold and grow in the hearts and minds of this group. The group has decided that we needed a new Bible verse that fit what the group stands for. We decided on 1st Timothy 4:12 "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in

faith, and in purity."

Last August we started a Bible Series about having a Sticky Faith for Christ and what that means for young adults and how they can take that lesson from a Sunday night meeting and use it in their everyday lives. The Sticky Faith series taught us to treat our faith like a living organism. Just like our faith, which evolves over time, we have witnessed and seen how A.S.K. Ministries has changed this past year. Whatever preconceived ideas or thoughts your students or families have had about A.S.K. I encourage you to give A.S.K. another try. This is not the same A.S.K. program from a year or even five years ago. Feel free to come hang out with us for one of the Sunday Evenings as parents are always welcome at all of the activities. This group has become a group of encouragers. Each Sunday evening, we begin our time together in prayer focusing on the concerns of each church that is a part of A.S.K. We also pray over any personal concerns that the students may share. Some nights we spend a large amount of time praying for our ministers in the churches to have courage and power to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ like the disciples did in the book of Acts. For the past six months of A.S.K. we have really dug into the Book of Acts. As part of this study we are looking at the different preaching and evangelism styles of the disciples and how we can use them to impact Plymouth, Indiana. Enough about how I

feel about A.S.K. Let's hear what the students have to say about A.S.K. Ministries and how it impacts their lives.

Eli Schramm from St. Thomas states, "A.S.K. is a safe place, full of trustworthy people where you can tell anyone anything. We play all sorts of games and learn a lot about the Bible and Jesus' story. We are currently studying the book of Acts and it is full of loads of interesting facts and stories. Aaron is very nice and adaptive with any type of kid."

Addie Kingston from Trinity says, "A.S.K. has really brought us together as a family to learn more about Christ. We have learned so many valuable lessons so far this year. Saul, later known as Paul, taught us that any evildoer can be turned to the Lord. Paul also taught us that whatever your background may be, you can still share the good news of Jesus. A.S.K. is an amazing program that I hope will continue for a long time."

The apostle Paul said something that I think explains this phenomena and how we should avoid it and be more humble:

Romans 2:1-4

"You, therefore, have no excuse, you who pass judgment on someone else, for at what-

ever point you judge another, you are condemning yourself, because you who pass judgment do the same things. Now we know that God's judgment against those who do such things is based on truth. So when you, a mere human being, pass judgment on them and yet do the same things, do you think you will escape God's judgment? Or do you show contempt for the riches of his kindness, forbearance and patience, not realizing that God's kindness is intended to lead you to repentance?"

The New King James Version says: "You, therefore, are inexcusable..." and there is a misconception that this means we shouldn't judge when people do things wrong. That is only PART of the message. It also means, that we know better and that we should not be doing those things! We as children of God, like children...like to play in the MUD. And, like children, we need a

bath (Baptism into Christ's death and resurrection) and like children, tend to go back and do it again the next day. (Our sinful tendencies...) But, again, like with young children...when we get to the point where we can tell others: "You really shouldn't do that because its wrong." Then we are old enough to be responsible for our own actions. And, God holds us accountable. Just like if you caught your child stealing and they were old enough to know better and did know better because they told other kids not to do it, should be held accountable. And its funny, because the last thing we want to hear is that we are responsible for our own actions. Because, we kinda like playing in the mud.

It also means we should act with humility...because, after all, we all make mistakes.

to inform everything I say and do. I want my faith to be the music that always surrounds me, that guides my path and sets the rhythm to my steps.

Adam Hamilton, pastor of Church of the Resurrection in Leawood, Kansas, and author of a number of books that many of you have read, offers some helpful guidance in a letter he recently addressed to his congregation. He suggests that when we listen to the news and hear about the social issues of our day, it's helpful for us to ask ourselves, "What would Jesus sav about this? What would he want me to do?" It is then helpful to look at scripture to see how Jesus responded to particular situations. For example, in recent days, we could look at

what Jesus has to say about children. We might consider Luke 9:48. When we wonder about "neighbor", we could look at Matthew 22:36-39.

As we consider our response to the various issues, we might come up with different answers, but asking the questions are an important part of Christian ethics. When issues are related to moral and ethical issues they can't be separated from our faith and our theology (what we think and believe about God). They may have political dimensions and there will be political solutions, but our faith and theology should inform how we understand many of these issues.

Our faith informs our politics, our actions, our responses. I so wish that the church would be more proactive when it comes to the many issues of our day, but more often

we're reactive: something happens and we respond. We'll receive a word from the Council of Bishops that rallies us forward, that urges us to action. We'll receive a word from a board or agency of the church that offers resources and guidance.

None of these possibilities give us THE answer, but they help us think about what's happening in our world and view them through the lens of faith. It's not necessary that we come to a common agreement, but what a beautiful thing when we can openly and honestly and without rancor share our different perspectives so that we can more fully come to know our role and response to what God is doing in our world.

KITCHEN REMODELING

It's time to remodel the kitchen in the Fellowship Hall! The flooring has become a tripping hazard, there is a very limited amount of hot water as the heaters we have don't work well, there are recurring problems with the outdated electric, and additional storage space is needed.

A committee has begun meeting to develop a plan and a budget. Some of the other items that will be addressed: Removing the dishwasher that doesn't work, adding a mop sink, and reconfiguring the cabinetry and counters along the west wall. Items that will not be changed at this time include the existing cabinetry (these are very solid), ranges, and refrigerators.

How much is the kitchen used? Monthly we serve a community meal to anyone who wants to come, the Boy Scouts have a meal, and The Well has a carry-in. We serve dinners following funerals and we serve meals in times of crisis. We have church meals, such as Bringing in Christmas, the Ladies Luncheon, and the Corn Roast. We serve snacks for VBS. We serve meals for fundraisers; and so on and so forth.

The flooring seams have been repaired multiple times and have become a tripping hazard and are hard to keep clean.
