A Note from Pastor Toni



Friends,

Each month I look forward to sharing time with our Marshall County Ministerial Association. I've enjoyed planning special worship services with them, and learning about how the different churches in our community are so different—and yet we each have the same desire—to love God, to serve God, and to care for one another.

In Ephesians chapter 4 (v. 1-4, 11-16), Paul reminds the church (then and now), that we have “One Lord, one faith, one baptism.” We

have different ways of looking at our faith and our world, different ways of doing things, but with those different perspectives— together—we are so much better than who we can ever be on our own.

In my message on August 5th, I shared a list of “Principles of Difference and Unity.” I thought I'd write them down for you so you might consider them as we interact together, both inside and outside the church.

Principle #1 is simple enough: *Being different is good.* Paul speaks particularly of Spiritual Gifts and how we're each given different gifts that come together for the benefit of the whole Body. That's a great thing! When each of us contributes our own

unique best, the church flourishes.

Of course, we're different in other ways, as well. I'm thankful for those who help me see a different perspective than what comes naturally for me. Sometimes it takes a bit to “wrap my head around” a different view, but it helps me grow and to be more open to the world. That doesn't mean my mind will be changed—but even then, it's helpful to experience how others see the world. It's a big place full of interesting souls, and I don't want my vision to be limited to my own experiences and perspectives.

Principle #2: *Being different doesn't contraindicate the possibility of unity.* Unity isn't uniformity. We don't have to



march in step, go to the same university or vote for the same politicians in order to be united and to work effectively together towards a common goal.

Think of the beauty of a quilt with all those different colors and patterns of fabric. That's the way you and I come together: our differences make us richer, deeper and stronger as we look toward the Master Quilter, who binds us with a common thread, our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Closely related to #2, principle #3 is: *Unity doesn't mean that you have to ignore or compromise your principles.* There are essentials of our faith: belief in the triune God—Father, Son and Holy Spirit, the sins of humanity redeemed through God's love, and the giving of Jesus Christ. We, as United Methodists, along with other Christian people believe in the mystery of salvation...we believe in God's redeem-

ing love poured out through the Holy Spirit...we believe in the oneness of the church of Jesus Christ, and that diversity enlarges our understanding. Then there are non-essentials that shouldn't tear us apart, but should instead, offer us the freedom (and fun!) of living within the mysteries and the unknowns of our faith.

Principle #4: *Just because everything looks good and smooth on the outside doesn't mean there's unity.* Unspoken disagreement can be a really bad thing! It's as harmful to us as never expressing your anger; it just isn't healthy for body and soul. But it's good for us, for the greater community and for those who are new in the faith to see us modeling appropriate disagreement, problem-solving and compromise.

Principle #5: *The presence of grace in our lives turns our differences into gifts that can be used by the Body for service in mission and ministry.* We

haven't all had the same experiences, and those experiences haven't always been good or easy. But, God is able to transform what we have and use it to benefit the body.

Those who have experienced illness, who have survived divorce, who have raised wayward children...and who have healed and gained wisdom from those experiences, have unique gifts to share with those who are going through the same kinds of experiences. Through grace, these difficult times can be turned into gifts that benefit the community.

Principle # 6: *Recognizing, affirming and using the gifts we've been given (our own and others), knits the Body together and promotes spiritual growth.* It's important we recognize and use the spiritual gifts we've been given. No one person, no particular family, no particular committee or work area is—on its own—is able to provide what is needed to make

the church a strong and healthy place.

We're all needed; each of us together.

We're all members of the same body; we're individually members of it. Our gifts and graces are important... and our various differences are what make us better than what we would be if we were all the same.

The final principle: *Our task is not to be uniform duplicates of one another, but to use what we've been given in concert with others,*


so hearts may be won and God may be glorified. That's our ultimate goal. We do it for no other purpose but to share the love of God with all we meet, and to give honor to God in all we do. We weren't meant to be the same, to have the same ideas or the same areas of expertise. But we're each needed—to give, to receive, to offer in-put, to respond.

Each of these principles is closely related. It can be hard to define one without describing the other. The bottom line is this: we're each

needed and necessary. Our differences are what make it a challenge to be together sometimes, but it is our differences that make us good. Our priority is that we remain centered and focused on the main thing (GOD), that we demonstrate love and respect for one another, and we encourage one another always. Then we can be who God intends us to be.

May we each find joy and blessings in our uniqueness,


Beginning Septem-

October 9: Church Council

"Looking Forward" We will look at the goals we set for 2018 (How are we doing? What do we need to do to "hit the gas" and finish the year well, and what adjustments need to be made?) This session will take the knowledge base generated in the previous two sessions and use it to set from one to four major goals for the coming year (with up to 3 years "in mind"). What missional outcomes do we feel God is calling us to achieve? What reallocation of resources might be required to achieve those outcomes? What do we need to stop doing in order to do what is needed now?

This will be our "final" meeting before Charge Conference materials are due (on October 12), so all our Charge Conference materials will be ready for approval at this meeting.


November 18: District Connection Day, South Bend Clay UMC, 3 p.m.

This is the gathering that takes the place of our former "Charge Conference" meeting. Churches around the district gather for a time of worship and inspiration. All are welcome, members of Church Council are requested to intend.

January 12, 2019: FUMC Leadership Summit (Saturday a.m.)

Along with the "call" to serve, comes the responsibility of the church to "equip" its leaders, in order that we can effectively carry out our mission and ministry together. That's why we gather annually for a "Leadership Summit": to review our mission and structure, to learn or to be reminded of policies and procedures, and hopefully, to be inspired as to what God might do through us in our church.



Fellowship Hall Kitchen Remodeling Progress

The committee for remodeling the Fellowship Hall kitchen has been gathering ideas and meeting with various contractors and have received a first round of estimates. Among the contractors have been cabinetry and countertop installers, plumbers, electricians, and flooring contractors.
