A Note from Pastor Toni

Friends,

I asked our oldest son Matthew to tattoo a scripture reference on my left wrist before I began my walk on the Camino de Santiago in 2015. I wanted that word of encouragement to be "at hand" as I stepped completely out of my comfort zone into what would become an amazing adventure. My tattoo simply reads

Joshua 1:9 to remind me always to "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid. For the Lord thy God is with you and will not forsake you." Yes, I hold

those words and that promise in my head and in my heart, but sometimes, it's good for me to look down at my own personal reminder.

When I do that I can almost hear God say, "You can do this. I've got you." I believe that with all my heart and soul.

At about 3 p.m. at this year's Annual Conference in Indianapolis, as we were waiting for a vote to be counted, I looked at my phone and discovered I'd missed a phone call from

Brian Liechty, our Trustee Chair. He emailed me the final report of Keller Engineering about our dome, and it wasn't what we had hoped to hear. Brian and I ended up texting back and forth and we both made phone calls after deciding it would be best to relocate worship to Fellowship Hall until we knew more. At that point we knew that the back

of our building (not under the dome) was structurally sound, so our 2 adult Sunday school classes were given the choice to meet either in the sanctuary building or in the Christian Ed

building. On Sunday, at an emergency called Trustee meeting we decided it would be best to close the entire building for all groups, to be sure everyone is safe.

At this moment, we don't have all the information we need, or the complete cost of the repair. We have a list of six construction companies who we've sent requests for bids, so we can have an idea on tim-







ing and cost. At this point, two of the companies have declined to evaluate our needs as they are completely booked and don't have the manpower to work with us. One looked us over, offered

helpful suggestions and also said he didn't have the people to do the work. A fourth has evaluated and we don't yet have his recommendations. We're waiting to schedule the final two companies.

We are anticipating that the repairs needed will be a two-stage fix: stage one will stabilize the dome and make the building structurally sound again, while the second stage will make per-

manent repairs. Our desire would be to move directly from the first stage to the second, so that we can get it done and move on to focusing on what we really want to do—making disciples, through worship, fellowship, classes and small groups.

It was only a few weeks ago when we were so excited about how great Rebuilding First Church had been, and now we have lots of questions. Now we're waiting. Now we're "on hold." But, I want

to encourage you with the words of Joshua 1:9: "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid. For the Lord thy God is with you/us. And will not forsake you/us."

None of us knows exactly what's ahead, but I do know, and encourage you to remember that God is

indeed with us. God holds the future. God will take care of us and will lead us into the next chapter. That chapter may be written in a little different way than we had envisioned, and yet I am convinced that as we continue to listen, to pray, to talk with one another, to keep our eyes and our hearts open to God's leading, we will do something good for Plymouth and for the Kingdom. Better even, than what we had imagined!

We'll keep you informed. You'll be included in big decisions. We'll keep worshipping, gathering for small groups and Sunday School and engaging in the various ministries and activities God has called us to.

Remember: We can do this. God has us. And God always will.

Mission Guatemala Work Team

At 4:30 a.m. on July 6, a team of 13 members, friends and family of our congregation will leave our church parking lot in a minibus, headed to O'Hare International Airport. At 9 a.m. we'll board American Airlines flight 1077 and head to Guatemala City where we'll land at 12:44 p.m. We'll then travel 3-4 hours in another minivan through the beautiful mountains of Guatemala, until we arrive at our destination at the Mission Guatemala River House, just outside the town of Panajachel.

Our general activities over the next week will include: Sunday: an overview and history of Mission Guatemala, and a cultural activity (what we do changes each time I've gone!). Monday to Friday: Travel to worksite and work under the direction of our Guatemalan team leader and along with a team of Guatemalans who are skilled and helpful—generally doing construction of some type. We return to the River House and eat supper at 5 and in the evening, sometimes have planned activities and sometimes just chill. Saturday is a non-work, planned group activity which includes a boat ride half-way across Lake Atitlan for a lovely breakfast at a beautiful inn. After eat-

ing and relaxing there, we'll then continue across the lake to shop at the artisan community of San Juan.

On Sunday the 14th, we'll travel back to Aurora Airport in Guatemala City where we'll board American Airlines flight 1025 at 12:28 p.m., which will take us to Dallas/Fort Worth. We'll board our final plane at 8:30 p.m. and arrive back at O'Hare at 10:51 p.m. A minivan will return us to our church parking lot sometime very early Monday morning.

Please pray for us in our travels and our work. We're thankful to be a part of a number of teams that are able to continue one another's work in the area of Panajachel. We're grateful for your support and look forward to sharing our stories with you upon our return.
