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#### A Note From Pastor Toni

Dear Friends,

Each August I look forward to attending the Global Leadership Summit (GLS) to listen to leaders in the church and from a variety of businesses and organizations around the world, as they share sto-

ries of leadership, community and transformation. For 2 days, I joined with more than 400,000 people in 135+ countries and I came

away inspired: some of the lessons I learned are lessons I learned long ago and have left forgotten in some ecclesiastical closet. Some of the lessons I learned were new insights. Through it all, I was reminded how important leadership is ("when the leader gets better, everyone in the organization benefits!"), and that all of us are leaders—all of us are people who have influence.

Since we are all leaders and you -like me- may need inspiring, here are a few statements I heard that I thought may be helpful as we lead and serve together:

\*GETMO - Good Enough to Move On. Craig Groeschel warned us that perfectionism can get in the way of the mission of the church, the performance of our team at

work, or the effectiveness of our teaching in the classroom. When working on a project or ministry, invest enough time and energy to be Good Enough to Move On (GETMO). "Perfection is the enemy of progress," he said. "The pursuit of perfection will limit you."



\*Changing an Unhealthy Culture. How do we change a congregational, office, or family culture that is tox-

ic? Bozoma Saint

John, a chief marketing officer, said, "Changing culture is a group effort." It cannot be done alone by a principal, pastor, or CEO but the movement towards health is a group effort. As a leader and team member, we can turn to others and ask them, "What can we do to make your experience here better?"

\*Being an Open and Inclusive Community. Our nation seems to be coming apart, with one group in and other groups on the outside. Many congregations struggle because different age groups, mission teams, and Sunday school classes limit themselves to their own group (s). Saint John, who is African-American, talked about becoming a genuinely open and diverse community or organization. She said (Continued on page 6)

something like, "Inclusion is inviting others who aren't like you to the party, but real diversity is asking them to dance." It's not enough to walk by one another at school, in the factory, or in the church, but we need to invite those we don't know and those different than us into our lives!

\*Leaders are Always Learning. Liz Bohannon, co-founder and CEO of Sseko Designs, started an African company (flip-flops that don't flop) that empowers women around the world. Leaders are always learning, she pointed out. We gain competence and then we discover it is time to begin another learning curve. "Great leaders not only celebrate completion of a learning cycle, but they celebrate finding themselves back at incompetence, starting to learn new lessons." We are always beginners and we are never finished growing!

"Each of us is terribly broken and beautifully bright," Liz told us.

"Dream small and start there,"
Liz said as she remembered
starting with an idea for a flipflop that wouldn't flop.

\*Stop Waiting. Ben Sherwood, a former top executive at ABC News and Disney, reminded us that some of us are always waiting to start pursuing a dream. "What are you waiting for?" he asked us. "Quit talking and waiting, and start doing!"

\*The Importance of Connecting with People. "Only connect," Ben said. Connect with your team members, connect with the people in your school or congregation. You can't lead people without taking the time to connect with them.

\*Every Generation Can Lead. An expert on the different values and work habits of different generations, Jason Dorsey told us that every generation brings something important to the world, and every generation (Baby Boomers, Millennials, and Generation Z) can lead. More mature leaders need to provide younger workers/employees/team members with specific examples of what is expected, and offer quick feedback.

\*Disruption as an Invitation. Danielle Strickland helped us see that times of change can be unsettling, but "Disruption is not a threat but an invitation to growth and something new." We live in a world of change (in the church, schools, community, and world) and it can feel like we're trying to sit/stand on a wobbly chair. But during times of change and uncertainty, we need to help steady one another and see the disruption as an opportunity to grow and move towards something that is both different and better.

\*The Art of Negotiation. Former veteran of the FBI's hostage negotiation team, Chris Voss shared the importance of hearing one another and collaboration ("let's solve this together") when we deal with conflict and difference of opinion. "Hear the other side out," he told us. "Turn the negotiation into a collaboration."

\*Don't be a Super-Hero. Todd Henry helps companies and organizations establish practices that lead to "everyday brilliance." As he talked to tens of thousands of leaders, Todd said:

"You must earn the right to be followed every single day."
"Trust is the currency of creative teams. When you break trust

as a leader, it is like popping a water balloon. You break it and lose it all."

"Leaders must have the courage to declare the undeclarables," referring to what isn't right and needs to be addressed.

"Being a superhero and trying to look always strong, having all the answers, and doing it all, just pushes people away."

"Take care of you," he reminded the leaders. Take time to center, be renewed, and chase inspiration.

\*Three Questions for Leaders. Jo Saxton, who works with congregations and women leaders around the world, gave us three questions:

"Who were you before anyone told you who you were supposed to be?"

"If your body could talk to you, what would it say?" (Jo then told us about the physical, emotional and spiritual exhaustion that nearly derailed her in midlife.)

"Who are your people?" she challenged us. 44% of employees feel burned out all or part of the time, and 50% of CEO's in a 2010 survey said they feel lonely. We were designed for community and connection. Chronic loneliness is dangerous.

\*Reward-centered Leadership and Servant Leadership. Organization consultant, Patrick Lencioni, said, "Fewer people should be leaders." He then explained that some people lead because of what they can get out of it, and others lead because of how they can serve others. "Be aware of your motive," he challenged all leaders. "If

your 'why' is wrong, all the 'how to' advice on leadership won't matter."

If leaders are leading because they want to be liked, or because they just want power or money, they won't risk doing the hard but necessary things like having difficult conversations, managing their direct reports, running meetings with effectiveness, building the team, and over-communicating the core principles/mission of the church, team, or business.

++++

All of us have influence. Many of us have the capacity to lead in one way or another. What are you doing to keep your faith connection with God strong? What are you doing to be clear about your life mission and the mission/purpose of your church, your ministry group, or your business?

Powerful, effective, worldchanging leadership ultimately comes down to serving. Jesus said he didn't come to be served but to serve. Businesses, cities, nations, schools, and churches will thrive when their leaders focus on getting better and always leading as a servant. Great leaders see leadership as a servant role, and they focus on helping others get better.

I'm thankful to be serving and growing alongside you!

#### September 1

12th Sunday after Pentecost

#### Communion

Text: Luke 14:1, 7-14

Title: Humble Pie

Theme: Jesus truthfully notes the inequities that exist in our ways of distributing the goods of the world. He not only notes these inequities, he commands us to respond to them by modeling behavior that is different from the ways of the world.

#### September 8

13th Sunday after Pentecost

Text: Luke 14: 25-33

Title: Calculated Risk

Theme: To join Jesus is to engage in some serious assessments, counting the costs of following him and of

what we will have to leave behind to do so.

#### September 15

14th Sunday after Pentecost

Text: Luke 15:1-10

Title: Lost

Theme: God didn't wait for us to come to our senses and come to God; God came to us, sought us out, searched for us, and saved us. When Jesus was criticized for partying with sinners, he responded with stories of people who searched for and found the lost. Jesus Christ is the one who seeks and saves sinners, inviting them to celebrate the inclusive, embracing love of God.

#### September 22

15th Sunday after Pentecost

Text: Luke 16:1-13

Title: Shrewd

Theme: The good news of Jesus Christ is good news for sinners: our status with God is not dependent on who we are or what we have done but is solely a matter of who God is and what God has done. In Jesus Christ, what God has done is to welcome and receive sinners.

#### September 29

16th Sunday after Pentecost

Text: Luke 16:19-31

Title: Listen!

Theme: In a shocking turn, Jesus offers us a parable about us—one that offers a clear warning to those who think that God's kingdom has nothing to say about our wealth and our ways with money here and now. Here he offers a hard and harsh truth: are we able to listen?
