A Note from Pastor Toni

Dear Friends,

As I prepare to write a sermon each week, I read a number of commentaries, articles and stories. There are good stories that don't make the "cut" for the sermon, but are well worth telling—even if you've heard them before.

This story comes from Philip Yancey who tells of a couple who planned a lavish wedding reception. They booked a banquet room at the elegant Hyatt ho-

tel, and made the required down payment of half the reception's cost.

But some weeks before the wedding,

the prospective groom had a change of heart. He found it too hard to commit, he said to his fiancée. He asked her if they could put the wedding on hold.

She knew what he meant. He didn't really want to think about it. He just wanted out. So after a very unpleasant scene, they parted company for good.

One of the bride's next stops was the office of the Events Manager of the Hyatt. The manager said she was sorry, but most of the deposit was non-refundable. The former bride-to-be had only two

options, she explained: she could either forfeit the rest of her down payment or go ahead with the party.

As Yancey tells it, "It seemed crazy, but the more the jilted bride thought about it, the more she liked the idea of going ahead with the party—not a wedding banquet, mind you, but a big blowout. Some years before, this same woman had been living in a homeless shelter. She had got back on her feet,

found a good job, and set aside a sizable nest egg. Now she had the wild notion of using her savings to treat the down-and-outs of

Boston to a night on the town.

And so, on that night, the Hyatt in downtown Boston hosted a party such as it had never seen before. The hostess changed the menu to boneless chicken—"in honor of the groom," she said—and sent invitations to rescue missions and homeless shelters. That warm summer night, people who were used to peeling half-gnawed pizza off the cardboard dined instead on chicken cordon bleu. Hyatt waiters in tuxedos

served hors d'oeuvres to senior citizens propped up by crutches and aluminum walkers. Bag ladies, vagrants and addicts took one night off from the hard life on the sidewalks outside and instead sipped champagne, ate chocolate wedding cake and danced to big band melodies late into the night" (Yancey, What's So Amazing About Grace? Zondervan, 1997, pp. 48-49).

As you and I think about feeding the hungry, there are several kinds of hunger that may come to mind, including physical hunger, spiritual hunger, and hunger for community. As we host our monthly community meals,

we are reaching out to folks who may be physically hungry. We realize it's one meal, one day a month, but it's an act of serving that is important and something that God calls us to do. This meal also invites folks into community, including people from our congregation, and people who might otherwise be alone, all are welcome—to sit and chat with

others or in the presence of others. Those coming for community may or may not be physically hungry, but the buzz of conversation "feeds" them. A new possibility is being "brought to the table" (so to speak!) called Dinner Church. This is when we spend some focused time, most likely during the last 20 minutes or so of the scheduled gathering time, where we sing familiar hymns, pray, and share a story from the Bible. It's not preaching, but a straight-out story from scripture that will help the listener know who Jesus is, and how loved they are. At Dinner Church, we let people know what we're going to do, invite them to remain (and let them know they can leave if

that's what they're most comfortable doing!), and to continue eating if they aren't finished yet with their meal!

If you're interested in participating in this venture—particularly by song leading or playing the piano—please let me know! If you'd like to be a part

of the continuing conversation about Dinner Church, please let me know! If you'd like to see how you might be involved in the community meal in some other way, please let me know!

God continues to surprise us, to offer us new and different opportunities that we maybe haven't considered before. Let's keep listening and following and keeping our eyes open to the possibilities that await.

October 6

17th Sunday after Pentecost World Communion Sunday

Text: Luke 17:5-10

Title: Duty

Theme: Sometimes we lament our lack of faith. We wish we could have more trust, greater assurance, and bolder belief. Jesus reassures us that a little faith goes a long way: we need to have enough faith that Christ can use what we have to do what Christ intends. In our everyday actions we are showing our faith.

October 13

18th Sunday after Pentecost

Text: Luke 17:11-19

Title: Respond

Theme: God refuses to recognize the boundaries we draw between each other. In Christ, God crosses over our boundaries, breaks down our walls, and puts us into new relationship with each other.

October 20

19th Sunday after Pentecost Text: 2 Timothy 3:14-4:5 Title: The Drama of Scripture

Theme: We come to church with many questions. Jesus teaches us, tailoring his teaching to our specific needs and questions, so that

we might each follow him faithfully.

October 27

20th Sunday after Pentecost

Text: Luke 18:9-14

Title: Mercy

Theme: In any church, on any given Sunday, you are likely to meet two kinds of sinners: 1) those who think they're in tight with God—righteous, moral and spiritual; and 2) those who feel unworthy of being in church, distant from God, and a failure at living godly lives. Both groups may be in for a surprise when they discover firsthand that Jesus Christ loves sinners of all kinds.
