
A Note From Pastor Toni

Friends,

We are currently living in circumstances that are completely new to me, and to most of you, as well. Things keep changing—almost from one day to the next. We have to keep listening and adjusting our behavior and activities in order to stay well and to keep from infecting others.

Today (Monday, March 23), we have been instructed by our Governor to "shelter in place." We're to stay at home except for the essentials, so I'm guessing this means that tonight there will be another major wave of toilet paper and milk purchases, along with whatever else might still be on the shelves before the stores close, sanitize and restock for tomorrow.

Living in Indiana, I've grown to expect the rush to purchase TP before a big snowstorm. I've experienced milk in short supply. I've even had to make the decision about canceling worship on several occasions. I remember one January in particular when it seemed that a big snowstorm was



predicted every Saturday for 3 or 4 weeks in a row. It was crazy! Every weekend I stressed about what might happen. I don't think we ever actually did have to cancel, but each week it was important for some folks to stay home. That white fluff and shiny slippery stuff made it clear that inside their home was the best place to be.

I can only remember one occasion of actually sitting on my couch on a Sunday morning, reading a devotional because we had to cancel worship. It just didn't feel right. But it was necessary at the time.

During this Covid-19 pandemic, many people in our area are affected by layoffs which may lead to food insecurity. Most of us won't have to worry about where our next meal is coming from, but many in Plymouth do.



The Neigh-Center (as well as Bread

of Life food pantry) are helping even more clients every day. Items that they need to keep in stock are cold cereal, oatmeal, peanut butter, canned tuna and chicken, soups, canned vegetables and fruits, hamburger helper type meal starters, mac and cheese, pasta and sauce. Fresh bread, fruits and vegetables may also be donated.



To donate, call Neighborhood Center at 936-3388 and tell them that you have items to bring to them (402 W. Garro). They will meet you at your car and unload the borhood items for you so you don't even have to go into the building.

It's necessary at this time, as well. I'd so much rather gather together with all of you in worship in the same space on Sunday mornings. I love singing together, listening to God's Word, and seeing your faces as we consider what God might have to say to us. But for at least the next 3 weeks we'll be worshiping together from our separate places. I'll either be here at church with an abbreviated team of your friends to live stream our service, or perhaps I'll be doing that from home, hoping Gracie keeps her distance and doesn't decide to grasp a starring role (Gracie is Scott and my new little rescue dog, in case you haven't heard her story yet). We'll take one day at a time and give it our best effort, whatever happens, whatever we need to do.

What's important, I think, is that we remain flexible, patient, and faithful. This virus has overwhelmed the medical systems of other places, and we want to "flatten the curve" by minimizing transmission and staying well. Occasionally a tinge of fear will nibble at me and I wonder how long this will last, how far will it go, how might our community, our families (church family and otherwise) be affected? But then I'm reminded of all those times I've read in scripture, "Do not be afraid." "Fear not." "I am with you."

I don't believe that we're to ignore the problems that are happening in our lives or in our world right now. We're not to minimize or act like they make no difference. We're not to pretend that they'll just go away. But God is consistent in promising us that God is with us and that the times in which we're living are not outside of God's sight or beyond God's care. God is with us and is walking alongside us as we negotiate our way through this uncharted course.

Please stay in contact. I'll be sending out notes to keep you informed of what we're doing a time or two each week. I'm planning, but not quite ready to start a daily email offering words of encouragement. You'll receive a phone call or two from members of your church family who are just checking in to see how you're doing. We've already discovered in this past year that First United Methodist Church is resilient, strong and faithful. We still are. We're here. We're together. Even in our different places.

So—stay safe, stay well, stay connected, stay strong. God is with us. Do not be afraid.

> training in receiving the risen Christ as he is, as he comes to us in all of his resurrected glory and presence.




A Reminder from Pastor Toni

Today we are proud to present the 30th Annual Blondena Kaiser Award. Mr. B.D. Kaiser established a trust fund after his wife's death in 1986, to honor her memory and to fund this award that is presented annually on the Sunday closest to her birthday.

The recipient chosen for this award must be a woman with high moral standards who has a strong love of children and a background of caring for fellow citizens and her church. She will receive an honor certificate, the altar flowers, and a monetary award based on the interest from the memorial fund.

This year's honoree has been a member of our congregation, along with her husband, since 1992. She is a very caring individual who shares her time and talents generously with her church, her family, and the community.

For many years she has volunteered as a Children's Church leader and substitute; a Children's Sunday School substitute teacher, and a Vacation Bible School volunteer. She has a kind and nurturing soul, and likes the opportunity to get to know the children of our congregation.


