My chest tightens a bit when I hear the advertisements—even now—that family is what the season is all about. As much as I love my family, they are not what the season is about. It's Jesus. And as I adjust to not being able to spend either Thanksgiving or Christmas with my mom and sister and her family, and possibly not with our children, either (Scott and I spent Thanksgiving on our own, so if that's needed, we will be fine on our own for Christmas, too. We promise to stay out of trouble.), I will still give thanks and celebrate the love of God, who gave us the gift of Jesus. He is the reason we celebrate.

So, back to my original questions—what's next? What now? What difference did any of this make? You and I are still waiting.

In addition, the food drive in June contributed 3 pick-up trucks full of food to Neighborhood Center and Bread of Life! What a wonder-

ful congregation we have!
