Dear Friends,

creates a nice glow on these cold winter evenings. I figured since we have no plans to go to a warm place—or anywhere else for that matter—for some time, that I'd bring the tropical to us this year.

Scott loves his tree, and I do, too. I took down our "regular" Christmas tree last weekend, and I still love it—but this one is staying up for as long as we "need" it and it'll go back up again whenever one of us is craving some warmth and sunshine. "Moving Forward" Information to the Congregation

This committee strongly believes

God is at the helm and is guiding us

to build His church building so the

congregation can continue to learn,

celebrate and carry God's word into

the world for the next 50-100 years.

Last September the Church Council appointed the Moving Forward Committee to begin the initial stages of addressing the building issues. The committee was organized and had its first meeting November 4, 2020. During that meeting, the members developed and agreed upon a mission/vision statement. They also had a tour of the sanctuary to begin to understand the

issues before the church membership. After the tour of the building the committee brainstormed nine options to consider in Rebuilding First Church. This included such ideas as but not limited to: rebuilding the dome to its

previous glory and bring the building up to code plus make additional renovations to update the Church; tear down the sanctuary and rebuild to current needs and standards; and build another church elsewhere. It is important to note that the nine options were the result of "brainstorming"—simply trying to list all of the possibilities that might be considered. Ultimately, the "Moving Forward" team will not be making the decision about our church facility. These decisions involve a process outlined in our church Discipline involving our Trustees, Church Council, and District Building Committee. Ultimately, a

Church Conference will be planned where all members will be invited to participate. Moving Forward will not happen without our congregation being well informed and having time to prayerfully consider what's ahead.

Since that first meeting the members have toured a church built to replace an aging facility that no longer

met their needs, and we observed and had discussions with other churches in the area who have issues like First Church to see how they handled their facility issue. The committee has also started working on a docu-

ment outlined by the Book of Discipline that will help us discern our resources and needs for the future. It involves an analysis of the church and community, a projection of potential membership with average attendance, the church's program of ministry and the development of an accessibility plan. Upon completion, this work will be offered to our Trustees and Church Council in preparation for out next chapter of planning and decision-making.




In spite of the growing number of Covid cases in our community, we are blessed to recognize that many in our church family are being vaccinated....

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
Update on the Sanctuary Building submitted by Brian Liechty

Although I know you can't "see" the progress, the process to get the insurance company to accept our claim continues. The public adjuster and legal team are constructing the arguments and collecting the proof to justify the validity of our claim to them. We've enlisted several technical resources, even testing the wood beams. The structural engineer has written a consolidating report of our journey and our lawyers are now talking directly with the insurance company lawyers about it. Our team feels that we have a strong position and is optimistic that we'll reach an agreement, though there is still no way to estimate of when that might happen.

In the meantime, Brent Kauffman has

spearheaded a journey of insight and discernment through the Moving Forward discussions. This groundwork will help us when the time comes to actually make decisions and begin taking physically visible steps in the future.

I appreciate your continued patience with this process—it's a learning experience for sure & taking longer than any of us imagined. We're in this together and rest assured that while we're exploring many different ideas, the groundwork we're doing is preparation to present you, the congregation, with the best options. No decisions have been made, and when the time is right to make those decisions, you will be part of them.
