Moving Forward Information

You might recall that within the last newsletter I noted our Moving Forward Committee has done some brainstorming in relation to our facility and its future. You would think that it would be simple to note a number of options concerning the facility itself. However as I learned (and I believe the committee also realized) that coming up with ideas about what we want in a church facility is a lot more than just brick and mortar. That holds true in examining our sanctuary and education building, whether we repair and renovate the building(s), build new, add on, or whatever the direction. The facility needs to meet the needs that God has set forth to us to accomplish in Plymouth (and for that matter, Marshall County and the world). In understanding this, the committee began looking at the ministries in our church membership, the community, and beyond. Here is an example: The need to feed the hungry and provide fellowship was identified and we have a dinner that is prepared for anyone who will come-without cost. This wonderful food ministry works well because of caring members. But it also relies on the facility to meet this ministry. Fellowship Hall with its access, large area for tables and chairs, and a kitchen for preparation (prior to COVID) has been a great place to provide this meal. Thus the facility is an important part of our mission to "Love God, Love others, Serve others".

ship in learning about God, helping us grow into God's hands, and supporting each other in God's word as we travel down the road of Christian life. Our sanctuary has been a key to that since 1915. It has provided classrooms, music area, pulpit area, seating for many, beautifully adorned windows, and on and on. Along with Fellowship Hall, our congregation has come together for worship, education, celebration, nurturing and fellowship to be equipped for ministry to members of our church, our community and our world.

I have listed these two examples in hopes that you will begin to look at our church facility in terms of our many ministries. You might see how many of these ministries we perform. Our committee identified about 30 ministries we have at First Church. As you think about them, examine how the facility affects those ministries. Understand, I am not suggesting nor pushing the idea that we need a new facility. What we do will be the congregation's decision. However, it is important to think about how the facility might need to change or be updated to meet the needs of our ministries and meet the needs of those who will inherit the debt. Of course, these decisions will have a financial cost tied to them and it is much more than just putting the sanctuary back together again. The issue of finances is huge. But so are

MISSION MINDED

Each month we will highlight a different organization that our church supports through offerings.

\$700 from our offerings goes to UMCOR; divided evenly between disaster relief in the U.S. and international disaster relief. These donations go through the Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church.

UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) is the global humanitarian aid and development organization of the United Methodist Church. UMCOR is a non-profit organization operated under the auspices of the General Board of Global Ministries. <u>One hundred percent of donations</u> are directed to an earmarked project or relief effort. Administrative expenses are funded by an annual offering collected by United Methodist churches on UMCOR Sunday.

UMCOR works through programs that address, hunger, poverty, sustainable agriculture, international and domestic emergencies, refugee and immigrant concerns, global health issues, and transitional development.

In the United States, UMCOR is one of the few agencies pre-approved by FEMA to be allowed access to disaster sites in order to provide immediate aid. Because they have established funds for disaster relief, UMCOR is ready to respond immediately when a disaster occurs. You can donate directly to UMCOR through our church or through their website. To give to disaster relief in the USA, use Advance #901670. To give to international relief, use Advance #982450. If you prefer, UMCOR has many additional funds to donate towards found on their website.

As Jesus prepares to give his life up for our sakes, what makes his sacrifice worth it? What are we willing to die for? Or maybe we should ask ourselves—what are we willing to live for?

March 28 Palm Sunday Text: Mark 11:1-11 Title: The Stage is Set

Theme: Jesus prepares to enter Jerusalem. He will enter majestically, hearing cries of "Hosanna in the highest!" His sight is set on what he must do; his intention is to be faithful to God, who sustains him. But soon the crowds will disperse and adulation will give way to betrayal and arrest.
