Dear Friends,

I've emerged from my basement office and am sitting at the dining room table working today. I'm going to re-create the sunroom office where I began working a year ago, to take advantage of the sounds of birds, windchimes and occasional dog barking.

Working from home has been a reasonable and productive option during Covid. It took a little getting used to, but it has

worked well. After Easter I'll be spending more time in the office at church, but there will be times when working from the sanctuary of home will be the best option.

As I've caught a glimpse of the cardinal couple who return each year to the nearly dead bush outside the dining room bay window (that I will advocate not being cut down for the sake of this beautiful pair), I'm reminded of the changing of the seasons, about the constancy of change,

and our continued need to adapt to life in transition. I have always believed in planning ahead and visioning, but the possibility of Covid and how it has changed our way of doing life was completely unforeseen by me, and I'm relatively certain that you hadn't considered it either. And

I am more than excited about coming together again for worship. I am

I am so grateful they have welcomed us into their space, and look forward to that temporary home where we will be guests as we continue to move into the future with additional opportunities for connection and relationship. ticed in order to keep everyone healthy, we have learned, and we will continue to learn lessons. They are lessons that make us stronger and better.

This cycle of change, much of which is familiar change, will require us, at least for a while, to practice social distancing, to wear face masks and to frequently wash and sanitize our hands (which has always been a good idea!). We won't be singing or speaking unison prayers, which means designing worship, and doing things the way we've always done them isn't possible. And yet, that's the "price" we pay for being together. I hope that you'll agree with me, that the price is worth paying.

It was so disappointing to not be able to come together last Holy Week and Easter, but in this season of new life, our gathering back together a year later is somewhat of a resurrection in itself. As Jesus was resurrected from the dead, so, too, are we given new life. As Christ's Body, we will continue to do what Jesus has called us to do in this community, and beyond.

There will be dark days ahead, as we journey together through Holy Week. All of our questions won't be answered when we celebrate the empty tomb on Easter, and yet we have been reminded once again that our Savior lives, that the church is alive, and that we have work to do.

I am blessed to share in that task alongside you.

> Life Food Pantry \$200, David's Courage \$100 (drug rehab. services). For the month of April, we will be adding our church's community meal which resumed at



Each month we will highlight a different organization that our church supports through offerings.



We support Operation Classroom with \$250 annually. This is given through the Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church.

From their website:

"Operation Classroom is a non-profit organization that partners with the United Methodist Church in Liberia and Sierra Leone in an effort to empower the people to rise out of poverty through education.



Operation Classroom has provided thousands of scholarships that have allowed students who would otherwise be unable to attend school to get an education. We have shipped nearly 100 containers of school and medical supplies to these two countries during the war years and the Ebola crisis. We've sponsored Volunteer in Mission Teams that have provided the opportunity for hundreds and hundreds of Americans to have "hands-on" experience in mission.

We believe that simply providing for a people fails to address the root cause of the poverty puzzle. It is the behaviors, social systems and mindset that create poverty. The key to ending poverty lies in the capacity of a people to change their views and perspectives so that they can facilitate change and engage in productive enterprise. We help young men and women in Liberia and Sierra Leone to gain an education that alters their perspective of what is possible."

Developing a Cooperative Relationship (Another) note from Pastor Toni

We have talked about it informally dur- to partner—in whatever ways we deing the time I've been with you, and I'm guessing that this is not a new conversation. It most likely began in 1968 when Trinity and First Church both became United Methodist congregations. Situated about 10 blocks apart, marking the entry and exit into the downtown proper (determined by whether you're heading north or south!), there have been cooperative endeavors, community worship services, combined choirs, and district cluster activities. We have moved in and out of relationship, each seeking to serve Christ and His Church in the

Plymouth community and ultimately, to fulfill our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

We are now in the process of exploring an in-

tentional relationship of cooperation between our two congregations. As Trinity prepares to receive a new pastor and as First Church prepares to make a decision about how we will proceed with our sanctuary, we find ourselves in a unique position of sharing. It will be an opportunity to consider our best strengths, and how they might positively influence our sister congregation. It will be an opportunity

termine—to better serve Christ in this community.

A plan is NOT made out for us. There have been mergers and combined relationships in other places, but there aren't specif-



ic steps outlined for how—or even if we "should" join together cooperatively. This is not a merger. We're not being told by "The District" or "The Conference" that this is something we must do. And yet, with over 100 years

> of ministry in each of our congregations, we believe that together we can be better.

Over the next few months, we'll be considering the possibilities.

We'll look for ways to relate and share. Our leaders will talk, our pastors will talk, we'll consider and reject, reconsider and adapt. I'm excited about the possibilities that await as we launch this adventure. Let us be in prayer for

our churches and our community as we consider what God might do through our combined efforts.

For the disciples, even "while in their joy" at seeing Jesus postresurrection, they were still "disbelieving and wondering." But 1 John reminds us that even though we may not know our next steps, we can be sure in them because we are "beloved" children of God and we will be like the one in whose steps we can surely follow — the resurrected Jesus.

April 25 Fourth Sunday of Easter

Texts: John 10:11-18; 1 John 3:16-24 Title: By This We Will Know: The Dance of

Love

It is love for each other by which we know we are followers of Jesus, the ever-attentive shepherd.
