A Note From Pastor Toni

Dear Friends.

Last summer, Scott and I took advantage of low interest rates

and purchased a home in Fort Wayne where we'll one day settle in near two of our children's families. It's less than a block away from the home we built in 2009 and sold in 2017. We

hadn't planned to buy another home at the time, and we certainly hadn't planned on purchasing a place in that same neighborhood, but it was like the doing anything. I'd feel awful if stars all aligned and it happened.

Our neighbors watch over the place in our absence, which include ducks and geese.

They've been in warmer places for the winter but have returned in full force.

A couple of weeks ago I noticed a goose sitting at the edge of

our property near the pond. She was there all day and was still there the next morning. I thought maybe she was nesting



but when I googled how that all worked, I didn't see another goose watching over her. She was just sitting all day and apparently all night, all by herself.

I started worrying about her; I don't know much about geese. I was afraid she was sick, and there we were watching her, not we later found her laying there dead-to learn that she had been suffering and we hadn't done anything about it.

Scott said not to worry, she's fine. Human neighbors said the same thing, though they also noted they never had a goose nest on their property before.

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A week later she was still there, but this time, another handsome goose was swimming nearby. Before long, she waddled to the water and they both took a swim across the pond. I decided to venture toward the place where she was laying while she had her back turned and quietly made my way in that direction. I wasn't fast enough and was about 12 feet away when she noticed and began flying back across the pond, honking loud and flapping with all her strength, while her companion swam behind as her backup.

In those few seconds at that distance, I didn't see any eggs, but there was a lot of fuzz. I decided she's fine, she's just sitting on a nest. I understand that that's where she'll be for about 28 days, with short breaks to spread her wings and stretch her legs. I don't think she left her eggs at all during that cold snap: she was doing a good job of protecting her future brood while I was trying to figure out what she was doing.

In the Psalms there are a number of references to finding refuge in the shadow of God's wings. "In the shadow of your wings I will take refuge till the storms of destruction pass by" (57:1). "He will cover you with his pinions, and under his wings you will find refuge" (91:4). "In the

shadow of your wings I will sing for joy" (63:7).

As I was watching my steadfast mother goose, I kept thinking of Jesus as he lamented over Jerusalem, "How often would I have gathered your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings and you were not willing!" (Matthew 23:37 and Luke 13:34).

I read these texts and it seems that we recognize and give thanks for the refuge we find in Christ and yet we do that in our own way and in our own time!

And so today, I want to express thanks. I am grateful for this season of our life together as a community of faith. It has been a time of learning, of stretching and growing. I'm thankful for the refuge we've been given at the UCC to worship together face-to-face. And I'm thankful for all who have offered care and friendship to others, tucking them under your wings during this pandemic. There have been encouragers: note-writers, phone-callers, and delivery-makers. The time will come when we can once again sing (out loud!) for joy! But until then, let's remain diligent and faithful as we await the new life that is to come.

MISSION MINDED

Each month we are highlighting a different organization that our church supports through offerings.



Broadway Christian Parish is another organization that we support through the Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church. (Giving Code C44.) Because of your offerings we are able to donate \$300 annually.

Broadway Christian Parish is a United Methodist Church with a strong outreach program in their south side neighborhood of South Bend. Following are some of the highlights of their work in addition to worship and Bible Study.

The Broadway Hospitality Room is open Monday thru Thursday 8:30-11 a.m. Folks can come by to eat breakfast, take showers, do small loads of laundry, get help with basic clothing needs, find assistance in obtaining birth certificates and other identification, and even pick up mail by using Broadway's address if they are homeless. This provides a great time for people to connect with others and with Broadway staff and volunteers and find support for individual challenges they may be facing. St. Mary's student nurses help out with health issues. Sunday dinner is served every Sunday following worship since 1982, with the help of other churches and faith service groups. "This has become a unique place of sharing as congregational members mingle with homeless people and others from various walks of life in what we see as our vision of the "heavenly banquet" that Christ calls us to. The average weekly participation in the meal has grown to more than 100."

They run a Food Pantry, a Christmas Jubilee allows parents to select gifts for their children, and Holiday food baskets are provided.

MAY 16 - 22, 2021: WORK TRIP TO MIDWEST MISSION DISTRIBUTION CENTER

At Midwest we prepare "kits" that are then ready to be shipped when disasters occur or requests are made. Some of what is prepared include cleaning buckets (passed out after natural disasters), school bags with school supplies, personal dignity kits, and new baby kits. If you can count to 5 – you have the skills that are needed! The director at Midwest will have a plan and be ready to assign us jobs depending on what they need done the most. Sometimes there are additional jobs requiring sewing and carpentry skills for people adept in those areas. The group will leave Plymouth on Sunday afternoon, 5/16, and return on Friday, 5/22.
