has changed, the way we interact with one another as a church and the way we interact together as a family—and in our families—is

all different, and we can legitimately blame that on Covid. "Rona" our son Chris calls "her." He and his family aren't feeling well right now, and they've each "dodged the bullet" a couple of times in being exposed, quarantining, and not getting sick. But I'm not sure they're so lucky this time. Rona has possibly moved into one of the Carmer households.

I'm really tired of Rona, and I

know you are, too. She has thrived in her role on center stage, and from what I understand, the next 8-12 weeks are critical for all of us. Rona has mutated a number of times, and she prolifically and easily infects whoever is standing close. Literally. But if we remain diligent, if

we follow the "3 W's" (Wash your hands, Watch your distance, and Wear a mask), she'll wear down and we'll step into a new

normal. The vaccine will be a major weapon to add to our arsenal, but in the meantime, we aren't powerless. Truly, the 3 W's will make a difference.

One of the things we miss is the "embodied" Body of Christ. We miss shaking hands and hugging, seeing each other face-to-face, and being able to respond to

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each other's smiles. We miss singing the hymns together. At one time, we lamented how we missed the pipe organ across the alley; now we just miss raising our voices together.

On All Saints Sunday, I so missed singing

"For All the Saints" with you and the organ. It gets me every time. The phrase in verse 5, "... when hearts are brave again, and arms are strong," literally brings to mind loved ones whose loving hearts and strong arms have sheltered me: in glory I envision them again as strong and full and vibrant in the pres-

ence of Christ. There's something about singing that together. I know. I miss it, too. Knowing that we won't be able to sing the Advent hymns (sorry, I'm one of those who loves singing the minor keyed hymns) and Christmas carols together doesn't make me feel any better. I'm really tired of Rona and the problems she's causing us.

But here's the thing: we are no less the church now than we were 9 months ago. We are still Christ's Body, and the Holy Spirit is bigger and stronger than Rona can ever be. That doesn't mean we behave thoughtlessly or carelessly "putting the Lord to the test" as Jesus talked about when the devil tempted

him in the wilderness. It means that Rona is going to ride off into the sunset, while God will continue to ensure that just as the sun sets each night, so too, will it rise again in the morning.

Be patient, my friends. Continue to be the church. Connect to our worship services online (or if you can't do that, spend time with

the order of worship and sermon and think about what God might be saying to you through the scripture). Read your Bible. Find a devotional or Advent study that sounds interesting to you! (Do it alone or with others. I'm including the names of a few new studies in this newsletter that have come out this year for



your consideration.) When someone comes to mind who you miss, give them a phone call! Send notes and cards. Gather and perhaps deliver food (to the neighborhood center, food bank or to someone who may just be getting tired of their own cooking. You can let them know it's coming and leave it on the doorstep!). See if someone needs you to shop for them if you're going out anyway. Show your love—however you best do that! Be kind. Smile (you can see smiles behind those face masks!) Be generous in your giving—to the ministries of the church and the ministries we have committed to support in





I have this quote above my desk at work. The year 2020 has shown me some of the ugliness of life; yet, I have had some wonderful experiences as well. Through the ongoing events of the pandemic, the political election, the unrest and violence in our country, and other things, the above quote has proved true in my life this year more than ever.

Working in the health care field as I do has proved very challenging this year. I have the best job of all in the nursing care industry. I enjoy nothing more than doing my Activity Director's job and providing fun, entertaining, and memorable activities for our residents. I have a job description above my desk which asks the question "What is the role of the Activity Department"? And it answers this: "...to assist all residents in developing physical, social, spiritual, and intellectual growth".

I LOVE that challenge and I take it seriously. When the pandemic began, things changed drastically and we all had to start thinking "outside the box". I welcomed others' opinions and ideas of activities that would still meet these needs plus stay within the guidelines set up by the CDC and our corporation. It was different but became our new "norm" as the news media calls it.

This past week things have once again changed because of COVID-19 rearing it's ugly head again in the Marshall County area. I'm once again having to rethink how to meet our residents' needs and yet keep them and myself safe from the virus. We are all tired of this virus and how it has changed our routines and our lives. It isn't pretty. But we are trying to make the best of an ugly situation. And the entire time I keep the above quote in my mind.

Many people think as Christians we should not have to face any hardships in life. We should be exempt from ugliness and pain. However, this is not what the Bible teaches us. Actually Romans 5:3-5 says

this: "More than that, we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because GOD's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us."

It says "we rejoice in our sufferings"...so...you KNOW that we are going to have sufferings and not everything is going to be perfect and calm in our lives. This verse supports the quote I began with... there will be ugliness in life but it is my faith in GOD that gives me the power to move on. I have seen it during this most recent lockdown at our facility. This time on lock down, a part of my job is to go door to door and check every resident's temperature at the beginning of the day. This new task has been a blessing in disguise. I am sorry we have to do this yet I have enjoyed my little chats and sometimes longer chats with the residents. I've learned so much and I can see first-hand what the isolation does to a person over an extended period of time. It is not good for people to be so isolated.

My challenge for you throughout the remainder of the pandemic is that you think of our shut-ins and those who care for them. Pray for residents in ALL nursing care and assisted living facilities. Pray that they can remain calm, anxious free and feel the presence of the LORD and feel the love of their families although they cannot see them or touch them. Please pray for the caretakers and all medical personnel as we continue providing the care your loved ones need and also continue to protect ourselves so we do not take anything home to our families or in to our residents. And remember one thing our residents can do is talk on the phone and they love to receive mail. Consider phoning your friends in the facilities and sending a note or card. It will really brighten a resident's day and you may just feel better too!
