MISSION MINDED

Each month we are highlighting a different organization that our church supports through offerings.

Thanks to your offerings, our missionary support goes towards the salary of the director of the Henderson Settlement (Kentucky), through the Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church. The annual amount we give is \$2500, given in equal monthly installments.

According to the **Henderson Settlement** website: "Our mission, as part of the body of Christ, is to lift up Jesus Christ by providing basic needs in Appalachia through God's love. There are four basic areas ...

WORK CAMP/ VOLUNTEERS IN MISSION: Work Camp serves two purposes at Henderson Settlement. First, and primarily, it serves as an opportunity to educate persons in mission and the needs that exist among the less fortunate in our society. Secondly, work camp often serves as the bridge between dreams and reality for families of the Laurel Fork Valley of southeastern Kentucky and northern Tennessee, while giving groups the opportunity to witness for Christ through home repair.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH including:

Food Pantry, Senior Center, Library, New Mother Assistance / MIHOW, Women's Group, and Youth Ministries

AGRICULTURE: The Settlement has been raising beef cattle for several years. Some of the calves and cattle are sold in order to help support the ministries of the Farm. There are four large GREENHOUSES, a high tunnel, and a germination room/office. During the winter months, the greenhouses hold the starts of vegetable and bedding flowers, which are sold to the community in the spring. The greenhouses offer a reasonable and inexpensive way for people to grow gardens or have beautiful flower beds. The greenhouses market mums, that are sold locally, as well as to Churches and schools for fundraisers. One of the greenhouses and the High Tunnel are being used for food production; Supplying the HS Kitchen and others with fresh tomatoes, cucumbers, green peppers, leaf lettuce, and kale.

CRAFTS AND THRIFT STORE including:

The Craft Store sells local crafts and logo items such as T-shirts, caps, etc. and the Thrift Store carries Household Supplies, Small Appliances, Knick Knacks, Used Clothing, and Used Furniture."
