The situations of my own grandchildren causes my heart to ache for all children,


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Worship in the Park, Sunday, August 2, 10:30 am


Community Meal will again be Drive Thru only.

Your online messages and Facebook comments are not for those only considered members of your church, but rather to the whole world watching and following you.*

From Pastor Toni:

"Our reopening team met and made the decision that we will go forward with the tentative plans we had



made to worship together outside at the Rotary Pavilion at Centennial Park on Sunday, August 2nd at 10:30 a.m. Please bring your own chairs, plan to social distance, and bring your facemask with you just in case. We will not share in the sacrament of Holy Communion, and will plan the various elements of worship following current health and safety guidelines. It will be different, but it will be very good to see one another! We will plan on livestreaming the service for those who are not ready to be out and about.

After that outside service on the 2nd, WE WILL RESUME online livestreaming worship only, until at least September 13th. The reopening team will meet again the end of August to consider trends and what we feel comfortable doing as we move into the Fall season."

Bible studies and other groups (10 or fewer participants) that usually meet at the church are welcome to resume in person meetings, in Fellowship Hall, maintaining social distance guidelines and wearing masks. **EVERYONE** who enters

the church must wear a mask. Realizing that most masks we wear are homemade or disposable and not the N95 filtering masks, we realize that doing this is not for our own protection, but for the care of others who are present with you. However, if we all wear masks, we have a better chance of not sharing the virus. If your group—or if you—do not feel comfortable meeting in-person, that is okay. The location of these meetings—whether in person or via Zoom—are completely at your discretion. You know your health and comfort better than anyone else does.

As Pastor Toni reminded us last month, and it bears repeating: “We all truly miss worshipping together face-to-face and the blessings of being together in community; however, in seeking to **do no harm**, we will continue to worship on-line. We will continue to seek to **do good** by remaining in contact with one another, sharing joys and concerns, and lifting up our prayers for one another. We will continue to challenge one another to grow in our faith and discipleship as we **attend to the ordinances of God** as we worship, share the Sacraments, study God’s word, give and serve.”

Leave a Little Room for God


Leave a little room for God

Online Giving Using Vanco

Download the free app from either the App Store or Google Play.


Allow access to location services if you'd like to use the app's "Find Churches Near Me" feature or search for "GivePlus Church". The app is free and you are not charged to make donations.

After you select our church, it automatically becomes your "home" or "default" church. The next time you open the app, the church you last selected will already be displayed.

GivePlus Church donations can be made with all major debit/credit cards. Use your phone's camera to quickly scan your card information or enter it manually. You can also give or pay using your checking or savings account. If you like, you may add to your donation to the church to help offset fees. If you set up an account and are logged in, you will receive a receipt via email, and you will also be able to view transactions in your giving history. You may set up recurring giving if you like. If you are giving to multiple funds, you can even set up different frequencies of recurring donations for each fund to which you are donating.
