### 2025 Trip to Midwest Mission Distribution Center



Dear First UMC,

Next week (June 4-7) our Lay Representative to Annual Conference, Sarah Smith, and I will attend the Indiana Annual Conference as representatives of FUMC. 
# Centennial Park Hoosier Old Wheels Shelter FUMC & Trinity UMC
