Dear First Church Family,

During worship a few weeks ago, our youth talked about a project they have been working on in which they are crocheting waterproof sleeping mats using plastic grocery bags. This project was inspired by Abi Pickut, who discovered the idea when reading an article about an organization that provides resources for people without homes.

One of the things I have noticed as our youth began crocheting these mats is the enthusiasm they have for this project. Not only can they see the outcome of their work, but they also enjoy creating something that benefits others. But what is even more exciting is that they want to share their joy with more people. They want to teach the adults in our congregation how to do this for a couple of reasons. First making these mats is time consuming, and they want to be more productive. Second, they are eager to be involved in a ministry project that includes the entire congregation.

I'm excited about this initiative because it is an opportunity for us to participate in a *multigenerational ministry*, which refers to the practice of including and engaging individuals from various age groups within a church setting. This approach is rooted in biblical principles, as seen in passages like Deuteronomy 4:9, which encourages teaching and sharing faith across generations. The goal is to create a community where different age groups can learn from one another, share experiences, and grow together in faith. Teaching and learning in this way used to happen naturally, especially in agricultural communities where multiple generations of families lived and worked together and took care of each other. In modern society, we live apart from one another – kids do kids' things, adults work away from the home, and older adults are often separated from their immediate family. Faith isn't shared as effortlessly as it used to be, and we are losing traditions and values as a result.

That being said, we are going to offer a workshop during the first week of August to learn how to make plarn sleeping mats, which will be donated to an organization that will distribute them to those who need them. The exact details are still being worked out, but it will be led by the youth, and there will be food.

I encourage you to participate even if you can only be there for part of the time (remember all the things we did as kids that were supported by the surrounding adult community – lemonade stands, wildflower sales, talent shows, trick-or-treat for UNICEF – this support helped to shape our creativity and our concern for others).

Making plastic mats alone won't solve homelessness, but it may be the start of an important conversation.


YOUTH IMPORTANT DATE TO REMEMBER

Parting Words: Love One Another **John 13:34-35**

What does it look like to love God and to follow Jesus? Hundreds of voices around us shout very different answers to such questions. *Believe this! Do that! Follow me!* It can be confusing, even frightening, to a genuine seeker longing to know God.

But in today's passage, we learn how Jesus wants believers to act on their faith—during His last dinner with the disciples, He simply encouraged them to "love one another." This, Jesus says, is how the world will know we are His followers (John 13:34-35). Love will be the fruit, the sign, the proof.

What does this love look like? That's a **fair** question, and Jesus has that covered, too: "Just as I have loved you, you should love each other" (John 13:34 NLT). Turning with compassion to the **hungry**, sick, fearful, and vulnerable, Jesus spent His life putting aside status in order to serve. He confronted the greedy and those using God's name to amass power for themselves. In a startling act of humble service, He got down on the floor to wash the feet of His followers. And soon after, He went to the cross in the most stunning display of love in history.

Our marching orders, then, are to love in the ways Jesus loved. This is how the world will know we are His. This is how the world will know *Him*.
