FIRST NEWS



While we were selling Nelson's Golden Glow for our trip to Guatemala last Fall, someone in a pickup truck asked me, "Why Guatemala? Why go that far away when there are people right here, close to home who need help?" Maybe you've wondered the same thing, or weren't quite sure how to reply when someone asked you that question. Here are some of the reasons why we went to Guatemala. Some of these same reasons apply for those who heed the call to become long term missionaries in various other places around the world, as well.

Remember how Jesus commissioned his disciples (us) at his ascension to "go out and make disciples of all nations..." After the day of Pentecost, that's what his followers did. The Book of Acts describes how the disciples of Jesus began extending beyond their own towns and comfort zones to share the message of Jesus Christ so that those who hadn't heard it would come to know. The letters that follow share more details of those ventures, and the challenges that occurred as they traveled outward.

United Methodists have believed, from the beginning, that each of us is called to participate in the outreaching ministry of Jesus Christ. John Wesley called the early Methodists to live out their faith by "doing good of every possible sort, and, as far as possible, to all [people]" (This is from The General Rules of the Methodist Church).

Our faith began as a "go out and share" kind of faith, which often is evidenced in "going out and doing." That doesn't mean there aren't things that need to be done closer to home: our church remains highly committed and involved in reaching out into this local community (our Social Concerns Committee keeps us committed to such places as Grace and Peace Alliance, Heminger House, and the Neighborhood Center, among others), as well as to other ministries in the U.S. (including annual treks to the Midwest Distribution Center [scheduled this month!] and Henderson Settlement).

But there are people who God loves and who need encouragement and support in other places, as well. Guatemala is the poorest nation in our hemisphere, and Mission Guatemala is only one ministry among others working hard to make a difference in people's lives there. There are other places where God's people travel outside of the U.S., doing work like digging wells, building schools, churches and providing medical and dental clinics. This good work wouldn't happen without Christians from churches like ours, in communities like ours, being willing to take the risk of stepping out.

I was introduced to Guatemala about 30 years ago. I had never left the U.S. before, and was amazed to encounter a culture so different from my own, but whose people were so similar to me. They loved their children like I loved mine, they worked hard just like we did, they loved and trusted God as much as we do…but their lives were so different from my own. Scott and I decided when I came back home that we were going to make it a priority that each of our children would travel to a different place (our plan was that it would be a work camp, but our oldest somehow "lucked out" with a Wesley trip to England while the younger two went to Haiti) to broaden their perspective of their place in the world and God's love for all people. Now, I'm thankful to have been given the opportunity to introduce others to Mission Guatemala because they do such work. There are certainly other good places to go, and there are places to go that are much closer to home, but we've been given this possibility of reaching out a little further, stretching a little further. As we reach out, we receive blessings in return. My prayer is that this adventure has and will touch hearts and lives—in Guatemala, and here in Plymouth, IN, as well.

Please pray that this will be so.


The season of Lent is a time of preparation for Easter. During these 40 days (which do not include Sundays, because every Sunday is a celebration of the resurrection!), we have the invitation to reconsider our lives, our faith, and our priorities to determine if we're where we want to be, if we're where we hear God calling us.

The season begins on Ash Wednesday as we remember our mortality, having ashes placed on our foreheads in the sign of the cross. We may hear the words: "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return," or, "Repent and believe the gospel." It is a solemn time, and yet it is a time of hope and anticipation, knowing that Christ died for us, and that brings new life for all of us.

Our service will include hymns, choir, scripture and a brief message introducing us to the Lenten series, Gifts of the Dark Wood.




Books for your Consideration



Our Lenten Sermon series is "Gifts of the Dark Wood," based on this book written by Eric Elnes. Over the weeks of Lent we'll explore how the "Dark Wood is the surest place to meet God. It is a place where (we) may feel uncertain, empty, lost, tempted and alone."

A second book is recommended for all members of Church Council, and others who are interested in learning about what it means to be "missional." As we read we'll consider ways in which our church is engaged in the world. We'll learn the difference between being a "missional church" and a church who supports missions. This won't be a sermon series but will be discussed at Church Council meetings over the year. Small groups and individuals are invited to read and explore.

Who Are Our Youth?

Who are our youth? Are they sized up by others as they were when I was a youth? People think: "Yeah, that new way of doing your eyeliner...that's youth today..." That way of doing your eyeliner kind of looks like an elf in my mind. That's not our youth though. Or for boys: maybe people think of a new sport, like Quidditch. Most boys love competition. Yet that isn't our youth either. To look at youth as a new game or sport, or a fashion is missing the point. We need to go deeper. We actually need to get to know each other.

Even if we don't know each other well, God has things to say to every generation. Some of those things are in the Bible and many of those things are learned through experience. To every generation, God calls us to repentance. Why? Frankly, it's because all of us make mistakes whether we like it or not. And, so that we can be brought to himself (because God love each and every one of us), God sent his son Jesus to die for our sins. We all make mistakes and none of us is without sin. Except Jesus.

It's a sad thing that the one who had to die for us had to be the one who was perfect. Or, maybe not...maybe it's a beautiful, wonderful thing. Even though it is also a sad thing. I think it can be both. God gave us himself as Jesus to be the path back home.

So while the world is out there, clamoring to you...Don't worry about that. Worry about what matters. God himself. Proverbs 9 talks about wisdom and foolishness being two different women. That's an interesting one. I'll include part of it so you can take a look:

I get this image in my head from The Lord of the Rings, when Aragorn and his companions enter the valley of Harrowdale and are seeking the King of the Army of the Dead. And there are all these skulls, bones, and they can't walk without stepping on the skulls. Crunch, crunch, crunch...Where are you right now?
