A Note from Pastor Toni

Friends,

Members of our community are making their way through what the water has left behind. In homes and businesses, there is sifting and sorting, deliberating, setting aside and tossing things that were precious, and things that cause one to wonder, "why did I even have this?"

It's hard work physically, and it's hard work emotionally.

In the midst of these challenges, I've seen beauty and blessing. People gathering to fill sandbags, to offer a helping hand, to move furniture and belongings, to bring a meal, to offer a shower or a place to stay. Cards and notes of encouragement, prayers—all of these are reminders that we're not alone when we enter those Dark Wood moments of our lives.

Maybe it's not water damage you're dealing with, but you're sorting through other things in your heart and mind and that has been hard work, too. Assumptions you took for granted, a relationship you held dear, a practiced way of living that has changed...sometimes no one else is aware that you're going through these Dark Wood kind of moments, and sometimes they don't know what to say, so they end up saying nothing.

But in these moments, too, may you know that you're not alone. God is with you and walks alongside you. The Dark Wood is not your permanent dwelling place, but you will come again into a place where you can see more clearly, where the path is easier to negotiate, where sunlight shines down and warms your face. Have hope. Be strong.

The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock (Matthew 7:25).

Phillips Brooks wrote this and it seems especially pertinent today:

Do not pray for easy lives; pray to be stronger...

Do not pray for tasks equal to your powers;
pray for powers equal to your tasks.

Then the doing of your work shall be no miracle,
but you yourself shall be a miracle.

Every day you shall wonder at yourself,
at the richness of life which has come to you
by the grace of God.

Join us these Sunday mornings during Lent as we continue our series on <u>Gifts of the Dark Wood: Seven Blessings for Soulful Skeptics (and Other Wanderers)</u> [based on the book by Eric Elnes]. God is with us, and God continues to bring blessings, even in the midst of troubling days.

MISSION MINDED

WORK TRIP TO MIDWEST MISSION DISTRIBUTION CENTER

It was a week without sunshine outside, but inside the Midwest Mission Distribution Center in Chatham, Illinois, laughter and lighthearted conversation abounded as our team worked on projects that will bring relief and hope to many in the U.S. and around the world. We worked alongside others from many churches who had also come to be the helping hands of Jesus. Our small group of Jane Woolfington, Carol Beiter, and Bill and Donna Hemmig (Steve Westfall got sick on Sunday evening, so he and Sharon were unable to make the trip) assembled 970 kits, including layette kits, personal dignity kits, and flood buckets. Bill also worked on constructing school desks and cutting pieces to make more desks, and he helped paint a donated semi trailer that the Center will use for storage. We were privileged to be present to pray for a shipment going out from the Center on its way to Haiti, a shipment of over 17,000 pounds of supplies that included hospital linens, bicycles, sewing machines, wheel chairs, birthing kits and much, much more. Working at MMDC engages us in a stream of servanthood, connecting donors to receivers, being the hands of the living Christ. The next trip will be the second week of May in 2019. BLONDENA V. KAISER MEMORIAL

February 25, 2018

Today we are proud to present the 28th Annual Blondena Kaiser Award. Mr. B.D. Kaiser established a trust fund after his wife's death in 1986, to honor her memory and to fund this award that is presented annually on the Sunday closest to her birthday.

The recipient chosen for this award must be a woman with high moral standards who has a strong love of children and a background of caring for fellow citizens and her church. She will receive an honor certificate, the altar flowers, and a monetary award based on the interest from the memorial fund.

This year's recipient grew up in a small town in the south where her parents instilled in her the importance of being active in their family's Methodist Church and living out what she was taught in Sunday school. While pursuing her career in education at a Methodist College, she became interested in and was involved with Civil Rights issues. In the pursuit of justice and equality, she invited college students from a black college nearby to visit their college library, which got her thrown off campus by her college president! This was unheard of back in the day, but because of her compassion and desire for justice she was privileged to meet Martin Luther King at one of their campus meetings!

While attending Southern Methodist University for her Masters in Religious Education, she met her husband and they were married one (1) year later. While her husband was finishing his degree, she taught elementary education at a Catholic school and then a public school. In 1968, they moved back to Indiana and their 3 children were born over the next 6 years.

After her family relocated to Indiana, they moved at least seven (7) times, due to her husband's employment. While raising children, she got her Indiana Teaching license, substitute taught in schools, ran a preschool at the Walkerton UMC, was involved in her children's sports activities, enjoyed 4-H with her children, was involved with many women's groups, and was active playing dart ball! During this time, her caring, loving, and nurturing nature influenced those with whom she came in contact.

In 1986, our recipient and her husband took in a teenage boy from a dysfunctional family and he lived with them for about 5 months. This experience made her realize they were making a difference and led to fostering 3 additional sons.

Today's honoree has treated children, teens and adults in such caring, loving, and nurturing ways, they have contacted her years later to say thank you for the difference she made in their lives. She continues to share her love with our congregation and throughout our community, serving both individuals and groups.

Our recipient began working for the Welfare Department and then SAFY (Safe Alternatives for Family and Youth). While working for SAFY – in several different counties - she obtained her Masters of Social Work. With her experience and her desire to help children, she went to work for Brighter Tomorrows in Plymouth which is a counseling agency primarily serving families with children. Her primary concern was to continue helping children through therapy, and she felt called to continue with her work even after her husband retired. She still serves as a consultant for "Crisis Care", and is on call for emergency and traumatic situations for anyone in need.

Currently she is active in WOW and Sunday School Class, teaches Junior Church, volunteers with Bible School, serves on the Casserole and Funeral Meal Committees, attends Joy Breaks, attends many Workshops, is involved in 5 book clubs, and loves to travel. In the past, she was involved in several United Methodist Women's groups.

She is very interested in missions and currently serves on the Missions Commission. She has participated in mission trips to Henderson Settlement and the Gulf Area after Hurricane Katrina. Most recently she had the "trip of a lifetime" traveling to Guatemala with 5 of her granddaughters. All this, and she still finds the time to spend with her husband, their 3 sons, and 15 grandchildren!

She serves as a shining example for the rest of us, and lives out her faith as well as our church's mission statement: LOVE GOD, LOVE OTHERS, SERVE OTHERS.
